THE MILITARY ASYLUM.

The worthy establishment known by this name occupies a commanding hill on the northern limits of the city, and is a comfortable home for disabled soldiers and sailors. The buildings are all that could be desired for such an institution, and so are the adjoining lands, the whole of which was purchased and then sold to the Government by the well known banker, George W. Riggs, Esq. The drives leading to this retreat are amongst the most agreeable in the District, and upon one of them, is the former country seat of the late and universally admired Joseph Gales, Esq., the able editor of the National Intelligencer. After Congress had appropriated the money for founding the Military Asylum, the honor of selecting the site was awarded to General Scott, so that the
