Badger's (G. P.) English-Arabic Lexicon, in which the equivalents for English words and sentences are rendered into literary and colloquial Arabic, imp. 4°. XII, 1248 pp. double columns (published at £ 9. 9 sh.), cloth. 1881. Reduced to £ 2. 2 s.

This is the counterpart to Lane's great Arabic-English Lexicon.

Absolutely, and *longo intervallo*, the best work of its kind. No one else has attempted so grand an undertaking, and the achievement has not been inferior to the attempt. The gradations and changes of meaning in Arabic expression, and the local varieties of usage, have been marked with extraordinary nicety and completeness; and all the scientific technology of modern English has been embodied in the alphabet. The book is a thesaurus rather than a lexicon, and stands in the same rank with the wonderful New English Dictionary and Littré's magnificent French work.

Redhouse's English-Turkish and Turkish-English Dictionary, new and enlarged edition, by Dr. Charles Wells, Ph. D., complete in two parts, forming one volume 8°. double columns (published at £ 2.), cloth. 1880. Reduced to £ 1. 5 sh.

The best practical Dictionary of the Turkish language in existence. The combined

learning of Sir James Redhouse and of Dr. Wells leaves all rivalry behind.

Wells (Dr. Charles), A Practical Grammar of the Turkish Language, based upon the best modern Turkish work on the subject; also including such rules of Arabic and Persian Grammar as have been adopted by the Turks, 8°. (published at 15 sh.), cloth. 1880. Reduced to 10 sh.

This Grammar supersedes for English students works of the kind.

Redhouse's Turkish Dictionaries: A Turkish and English Lexicon; shewing in English the signification of the Turkish terms; by Sir James W. Redhouse, complete in 1 vol. imp. 8°. hf. bd. Reduced to £ 2. 10 sh.

Turkish Chrestomathy: Dr. Charles Wells, the Literature of the Turks: a Turkish Chrestomathy, 8°. XX and 272 pp. cloth. 1891. Reduced to 16 sh.

The first Turkish Reading book ever published, consisting of Extracts in Turkish from the best Turkish Authors (Historians, Novelists, Dramatists), with interlinear and free translations in English, biographical and grammatical notes and Facsimiles of MS. Letters and Documents.

The three preceding works are in themselves a sufficient apparatus for acquiring a mastery of the Turkish language.

Faris's Arabic Grammar, new edition: Practical Grammar of the Arabic Language, with Interlineal Reading Lessons, Dialogues and Vocabulary. Fourth Edition, revised from the Rev. H. A. Williams' improved issue of the book, 12°. pp. VIII and 234, cloth. 1891. 7 sh. 6 d.

The celebrity of Faris ash-Shidyak as the greatest of modern Arab scholars, guarantees the usefulness of this little volume which is an endeavour to simplify the acquisition of the language.

Cameron (D. A.), Arabic-English Vocabulary, for the study of the Arabic vernacular as spoken in Egypt, 8°. about 400 pp. cloth. Nearly ready 7 sh. 6 d.

The author is in the service of the Anglo-Egyptian government as an interpreter in the law courts of Cairo. His work is indispensable for travellers in Egypt, as it will be found to be the first systematic repertory of the colloquial language of that country.
