This book is the only one dealing in a general way with the Natural History of the Riviera. This splendid book, the life-work of its enthusiastic author, is one of the most important of its kind ever published. It treats of the butterfly fauna of Central and Western China, up to the border of Thibet; and the countries of Japan and Corea. All the species known to inhabit the region dealt with are included, and in nearly every case the original description of each species is given. All the species described in the book are figured, and some others, where necessary for the convenience of the student, are also represented.

The Collection described in this Catalogue consists of MSS. in the Sa'idic, Middle Egyptian, and Bohairic dialects of Coptic. Of these, the first group comes mainly from the White Monastery at Ahmin, the second mainly from the Fayyûm, and the third from the Nitrian monasteries.
