One of the noblest and most responsible tasks has been entrusted to the publisher. It is in his power to make his nation acquainted with the work of its poets and thinkers, and consequently he contributes considerably to the development of the cultural life of his time.

May the International Publishers' Congress help to smooth the way leading to the fulfilment of this great task in the service of the peoples and of peace.
