Argillaceous Earths.

I HESE are for the most part diffusible in water, and do not immediately fink in it as fands do; or if so compact as immediately to fink, they soften, crumble, or moulder away in it, some sooner, some later, either to a ductile viscid pulp, or to a powder.

Hardness, scarce ever exceeds 6; they harden when heated; scarce ever effervesce with acids,

and are difficultly foluble in them.

As earths originally received their denominations from external and not from internal characters, they cannot now, without creating much confusion, be arranged according to their real specific properties, if any such could be affigned. But in fact none such can, except fusibility or infufibility, which depend on proportions and ingredients both mutable and cafual. Hence I shall fort them under the title of different Tribes; marking the cases in which these are found to be more or less fusible, or adapted to various uses. Ist Tribe.
