Anas Anser mansuetus — serus. Lin. Syst. I. p. 197. L'Oie domestique, l'oie sauvage. Bris. Orn. VI. p. 262, 265.

This species is nearly the size of the preceding, being in weight seven pounds. The bill is long for birds of this genus, and slender at the end, of a dull orange colour in the middle, with the base and nail black. The head, neck, and back, are greyish brown: the under parts, dull white: wing coverts, grey brown, with white tips and edges to the seathers: quills, dull black: rump, white: tail, blackish: legs, dull orange.

The name of bean goose is given to this bird from the resemblance of the nail at the end of the beak to a horse-bean. It is a regular visitor to us in winter, and returns to the northern parts of Scotland and the Continent late in the spring to breed. It likewise inhabits the north of America.
