TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

EARTHQUAKE IN SAMOA.

San Francisco, January 14.

The S. S. "Ventura" which has arrived here brings news of a violent earthquake having been felt at Apia in Samoa on the 21st ult. The German seismographic station there ascertained that the earthquake was due to a submarine disturbance 900 miles to the South.

PRESIDENT CASTRO.

Frankfort o. M., January 14.

The Frankfurter Zeitung announces from New York that it is reported from Caracas that President Castro is confined to his bed.

NEWS FROM FRANCE.

THE FRENCH SENATE.

Paris, January 14.

After the House had passed the Labour Ministry Estimates, a discussion began on the estimates of the Ministry of Public Works.

M. Perrier referred to the French railways and remarked that France had only two lines leading into Italy while Germany had eight; this state of things should be remedied not only for economic but for political reasons. The speaker asked if the Italian Government had granted their consent to the construction of a second line from Modane to Susa on the Paris-Turin section.

M. Barthou, Minister of Public Works, replied that he had every hope that the line from Modane would be reconstructed. The time had come when the question of lines leading into Italy must be solved in the national interests; the Government would hasten their decision.

These estimates as well as those of the Colonies were then passed and the House adjourned.

SERIOUS STREET ACCIDENT.

Paris, January 14.

While working in the street on the Boulevard St. Germain four workmen were overwhelmed by a subsidence of earth; one of them, by name Smith, was brought out dead, and the three others were slightly injured.

LABOUR DISPUTES.

Paris, January 14.

The Prime Minister Monsieur Clémenceau and the Labour Minister Monsieur Viviani today received deputations from the Municipality, the Chamber of Commerce, and the Employers of Fougères. Monsieur Clémenceau advised the Employers to enter into negotiations with the workmen in order to arrive at an understanding. He also informed them that a deputation of the Labour Committee of the Chamber would proceed next week to Fougères.

THE GEISPOLSHHEIM DISASTER.

Strassburg, January 14.

The corpses of the unfortunate victims of the Geispolsheim disaster were buried today, an enormous crowd witnessing the funeral. One large box, just large enough to hold one man sufficed, for the remains of 22 victims.

THE EX-ARCHDUKE LEOPOLD.

Zürich, January 14.

Leopold Wolfing has charged one of the leading attorney's of Zürich with the constitutional question as to whether it is possible for him to become Archduke once more after divorcing his wife. The petition for divorce has been issued by both parties. The case will be tried in Geneva.

A STEAMER STRANDED.

Hamburg, January 14.

A telegram dated January 9. from Lome states that the s. s. "Lucie Woermann", bound from Duala to Hamburg stranded not far from Lome in a fog.

The passengers and mails were landed in Lome. The ship is watertight, but steering post and rudder are broken. The s. s. "Hans Woermann" is endeavouring to tow the stranded vessel off. Two other vessels of the same line, have been ordered to her assistance, and one of them left Lagos for Lome yesterday.

THE ECLIPSE.

Hamburg, January 14.

The Hamburg Observatory has received a report from the expedition sent from that Observatory to Dshisak, in Russian Central Asia, there to observe the total eclipse of the sun on the 14th of January, that during the whole time of the eclipse the sky was completely clouded over and snow was falling, and that only photometric observations could therefore be made.

NEWS FROM RUSSIA.

THE REVOLUTIONARY MOVEMENT.

St. Petersburg, January 14.

According to reliable information in contradiction of the report in the *Russ* as to the domiciliary visit paid to a house in the Wassily-Ostrov quarter it has been ascertained that one policeman was shot, and another and a district inspector wounded. The police did not retreat, but after searching the house arrested ten persons; during the search only one Mauser rifle was found.

THE NEW YEAR'S RECEPTION.

St. Petersburg, January 14.

The Czar, the Czarina and the Empress Dowager received the whole *corps diplomatique* today in Czarkoe-Selo to receive their New Year's congratulations.

MINISTERIAL APPOINTMENTS.

Monsieur Frisch has again been appointed President for the Imperial Council for the first half-year of 1907, Monsieur Golubeff being reappointed Vice-president.

The autograph letter from the Czar to the Finance Minister Monsieur Kokovzov is signed "your grateful Nicholas."

PANIC ON A SHIP.

Paris, January 14.

Certain evening journals assert that the German Packet boat "Meteor" ran among the German Mediterranean fleet while engaged in night manoeuvres. An unexpected cannonade caused great panic on the German ship, but no casualties are reported.

A TURKISH OFFICIAL IN DISGRACE.

Paris, January 14.

The *Agence Havas* announces from Smyrna that Kiamil Pascha, whom the Sultan had sent as Governor General to Smyrna, believed that he had fallen into disfavour and fled to the English Consulate General. Thence he appealed to the Sultan by telegraph to allow him to return to his home in Cyprus. The military commandant has been appointed temporary Governor of Rhodes.

Constantinople, January 14.

Kiamil Pasha was Wali of Smyrna and was banished to Rhodes on account of the robberies committed by his son Said Pasha. He still remains at the English Consulate General although the Sultan has offered him free choice of a place of residence in the Turkish empire.

Later.

Kiamil Pasha has left the English consulate after receiving permission from the Sultan to return to Constantinople.

THE MOROCCAN CRISIS.

Toulon, January 14.

The cruiser "Charlemagne" arrived in the roads here from Tangier this afternoon. She will enter the harbour basin tomorrow to undergo repairs. The "Charlemagne" brings the news from Tangier that the situation there is satisfactory. During her stay in Moroccan waters, officers and men of the crew went ashore daily, without encountering any hostility. Several officers were present at the reading of the Sultan's proclamation ordering Raisuli's deposition. It is believed that Raisuli still remains in the thickets in the vicinity of Zinat. During the bombardment of this town the French ships refrained from attacking, and remained at a distance of 7 kilometres from the coast. Admiral Touchard has announced his intention of returning with the cruisers "Suffren" and "Saint Louis" at the beginning of February. According to one report the armoured cruiser "Condé" is to proceed to Tangier.

Berlin, January 14.

With reference to the complaints made by the *Paris Temps* on the occasion of Major v. Tschudi and Captain Wolf having entered the Moroccan service the *Nordd. Allg. Ztg.* states: Major v. Tschudi, who has hitherto been serving in the railway regiment and the telegraph department, is an officer who is a good linguist and proficient in all technical branches; he accompanied the German envoy Dr. Rosen on his journey to Fez and was then engaged by the Sultan as his adviser in any technical questions that might arise. It is possible that he may also be employed by the Sultan, as is allowed by Article 108 of the Algeciras decrees, in drawing up estimates and plans for public works for which tenders are in the near future to be asked. The right to choose his advisers for his enterprises unquestionably falls to the Sultan as sovereign of an independent country. Whether Herr v. Tschudi has at the same time received private instructions from the firm of Krupp, in order in some way to further their private interests, we do not know. In any case these can be no breach of the regulation that public branches of the service in the Shereefian empire cannot be utilised for private interests or of a breach of the clauses of the Algeciras decrees as to the carrying out of public works. Captain Wolf goes to Morocco merely as the Major's companion. Neither he nor the Major have been engaged as instructors.

London, January 15.

The *Daily Telegraph* announces from Tangier that a store has been opened in Mogador for the sale of Chassepot rifles and cartridges which will be offered to all the natives who are leaving for the interior.

Madrid, January 14.

It was announced at the Ministry for Foreign Affairs today that, in consequence of the flight of Raisuli, the reasons which justified the presence of French and Spanish warships in Tangier waters no longer existed; the warships will therefore be ordered back if the Sultan guarantees the establishment of a police force.

Madrid, January 15.

The Ministerial Council has empowered the Minister for Foreign Affairs to come to an understanding with the French Government as to the withdrawal of some of the Naval forces lying off Tangier.

GAS-EXPLOSION.

Posen, January 15.

A violent explosion occurred today in the meter-house of the Town Gas Works. The building was entirely destroyed and the neighbouring buildings suffered great injury. Almost all the windows and many of the doors in the houses in the Graben and Dammstrasse were shattered and some of the rooms were wrecked. There was no loss of life and four people only were slightly hurt. The cause of the explosion has not been ascertained as yet.

GENERAL NEWS.

(From our London correspondent.)

Sir Henry Campbell-Bannerman, the Prime Minister, is to be presented with his portrait by the Liberals of Scotland. Subscriptions will be taken by Mr. A. D. Wood, 95, Princes-street, Edinburgh. They are to be limited to one guinea, but the promoters will be very pleased to accept sums of 1/- and upwards.

At Preston, in Lancashire, influenza has been so rampant that parties of mourners have positively had to be kept waiting by the undertakers there, so rapid have the deaths been one after another.

Yesterday (Monday) the subject for debate in the conference room of the National Liberal Club was "Women's Suffrage".

A lady who had lived apart from her husband, and who had suffered from insomnia, committed suicide by drowning herself at Hampstead on Friday last. She was the wife of Mr. Harry Dobb, a barrister. Although she was seen struggling in the water for quite 20 minutes no one went to her assistance.

The Empress Eugenie is expected to arrive very soon at Cap Martin, and may possibly be visited there by Princess Henry of Battenberg before Her Royal Highness goes to Madrid.

Lily, Duchess of Marlborough, left Dorking last week, since when she has been staying in Brighton.

Amongst the appointments to the Royal Victorian Order are those of the Duke of Devonshire to be Knight Grand Cross, Lord Charles William Augustus Montagu to be Commander, and Mr. Gilson Martin and Mr. Edward Mason Wrench to be Members of the Fourth Class.

Mr. Haldane left Glasgow on Saturday to spend the week-end at Knowsley with the Earl and Countess of Derby.

A man's hand, with three valuable rings on the fingers, was found inside a pike weighing 25 lb. caught at Staud on the Lake of Constance.

In the first round of the Association Cup, played on Saturday, the Southern clubs were only moderately successful. Among those that go on into the next round are the "spurs", Southampton, Plymouth, Crystal Palace, Bristol Rovers and Bristol City. Brighton, Reading, Woolwich Arsenal and Hastings all suffered defeat.

Wales gave a very different show to that displayed by them against the Springboks, in their match against England under Rugby rules on Saturday. The match was played at Swansea, and England suffered defeat by 21 points to 0.

A book of songs specially compiled for use in the Royal Navy is about to be issued by the Admiralty for His Majesty's ships.

No less than three thousand persons, including King Edward and the Prince of Wales, were present to hear the Duke of the Abruzzi lecture on his ascent of the Ruwenzori Mountains, last Saturday at the Queen's Hall.

The lecture, which was delivered under the auspices of the Royal Geographical Society, was illustrated by views thrown on a huge limelight screen, on either side of which hung the British and Italian flags.

In conclusion of a most intellectual discourse, the Duke of the Abruzzi paid a most graceful tribute to the Colonial prowess of Great Britain. Before the applause which followed had toned down, King Edward rose and in an admirable speech returned thanks on his own behalf and that of the Royal Geographical Society for the interesting lecture which the Duke of the Abruzzi had just given them.

Excellent reports continue to reach London concerning the improvement in the health of King Oscar of Sweden. There is now every reason to hope that the visit of the King and Queen of Denmark to Sweden will take place.

Countess Cadogan, who has been suffering from influenza, has really been in a very critical state, but is, I am pleased to say, now able to get some sleep and is reported by her doctor more favourably.

Mr. James R. Roosevelt, jun., who is a cousin of the President of the United States, is now appearing as defendant in a suit, brought by Mr. John Baller, a book maker, for the alleged alienation (as it is termed in New York) of his wife's affections.

After only three weeks' marriage Mr. Baller swears that Mr. J. R. Roosevelt, jun., has stolen his bride and asks £10,000 damages. The fact of its being so closely connected with the White House family has naturally caused extra publicity to have been made of this unpleasant business.

It does not seem to be generally known that the late King of Hanover became totally blind through an accident which occurred at Kew. He was born with one eye sightless, and lost sight in the good eye by swinging about one of the old fashioned silk purses with an acorn tassel at each end, one of which accidentally struck his eye.

The United States Postmaster-General has for some time past contemplated the erection in the streets of New York of penny-in-the-slot stamp

machines. These are for the benefit of the clerks on whom enormous pressure has of late been placed.

At the Royal ball given by the Marquis and Marchioness of Exeter at Burghley in honour of the Princess Henry of Battenberg, Her Royal Highness was elegantly attired in black and wore a priceless lace scarf with beautiful diamonds.

The order for the Court mourning had not then been issued, but Princess Frederica, daughter of the late Queen of Hanover, being a very close friend of Princess Henry's, she immediately adopted mourning. Many ladies present at the ball also wore black out of compliment to Princess Henry of Battenberg.

Several alterations have been made at Kensington Palace during the last few years through the instrumentality and artistic taste of Princess Louise Duchess of Argyll.

The Princess Louise's apartments in the Palace are on the ground floor, but she also has rooms in the floor above, whilst her beautiful studio is in the garden, and is reached by a covered way from her own apartments.

Another plot is reported to have been hatched against the life of the King of Italy. The police in Paris are now busy investigating the matter, warning of which was given in a letter from Milan, signed "Rossi".

I alluded some days ago to one of the English sea side resorts having been decided on for a visit from the German Empress with her younger children during the summer. It is now announced that Felixstowe is the place selected.

Some solution is at last to hand respecting the mysterious disappearance of Mr. Melford Martin, a wealthy young American, from Brighton where he

was staying with his mother at a large boarding-house 19 months ago. A collar which no doubt belonged to him, was found clinging to one of the piles which support the West Pier, and it can safely be assumed that he either fell or was thrown into the sea and drowned.

It was a stormy night, and from evidence received from the detective who had charge of the case Mr. Martin was seen on the pier, where he went direct from the boarding-house. He was in an elated condition, and was ever then drinking from a flask containing whisky, which he sipped at intervals, dancing about in front of a young woman in charge of one of the stalls. Under such circumstances an accident might easily have happened, although the body has never been recovered.

There has been some excitement in Court circles over the reconciliation of the German Emperor with Prince Philip Hohenlohe, who was invited to lunch at the palace. The Emperor treated the Prince very cordially.

Considerable business is promised in the English Law Courts. The term opens with a long list of appeals and causes for hearing. In the Court of Appeal there are 345 cases to be disposed of. In the King's Bench Division there are 714 actions for trial, and 366 cases to be settled in the Divisional Court. On the Chancery side 310 cases are on the list, and there are 362 cases in the Probate, Divorce and Admiralty Division, 112 of them being Admiralty actions and the others Divorce and Probate.

Mrs. Russell Sage, the widow of the famous Wall Street millionaire, is being pestered constantly by so many beggars and others, as to make her life almost a misery, through the responsibility of having £2,000,000 to give away in charity.

Since the days of Peter the Great no member of the house of Romanoff has obtained a release from the bonds of matrimony by means of divorce. Therefore considerable surprise has been manifested in Russia through the Czar promulgating an ukase dissolving the marriage of Duke George of Leuchtenberg from his wife, who is one of the daughters of the Prince of Montenegro and sister to the Queen of Italy.

It is certainly true that two of the Czar's relatives are married to divorced women, as the Grand Duke Cyril married the divorced wife of the Grand Duke of Hesse, Princess Victoria Melita of Edinburgh, and the Grand Duke Paul is wedded to the divorced wife of his former aide-de-camp, General Baron Pistolkors.

Divorces, however, are practically unknown in the reigning house of Russia. The Russian Church is extremely strict about granting divorces. Marriages can only be dissolved with the consent of the Emperor, who is not only the temporal but also the spiritual leader of the Muscovite Church.

Entire sympathy in the recent divorce rests with the Duchess Stana (Anastasia) whose husband has always been regarded as entirely given up to drink, a misfortune which has already killed two of his brothers.

SUMPTUOUS FUNERALS.

The recent deaths of two Cardinals in Rome has drawn attention to the striking survivals of medieval pomp which still characterise the obsequies of members of the Sacred College. The two parishes of which they were respectively the titular heads will each derive a benefit of at least £200 in the way of fees and dues. Some of the show parts of these ceremonies strike Westerns as almost barbaric. Among other things, banners at £4 apiece droop at the four corners of the catafalque, and under each stands a professional wailer—piangono they call him in Italy—whose business it is to wear a look of desolation. As for the gratuities—they extend even to the spectators, while those who perform even trifling duties in connection with the funeral receive extravagant pay. These funeral dues in the case of distinguished persons are of such vital moment to Roman parish priests that once when the French Ambassador to the Quirinal died in the Italian capital, although his body was removed to Bayonne for burial, the rector of the Roman parish of Santa Catarina della Rota, in which he died, claimed his dues of about £250 and got them.

LOCAL.

His Majesty King Friedrich August gave a dinner party on Monday evening at the Royal Castle. Among the numerous and distinguished guests were Viscount Gough, the British Minister Resident, and Colonel Wilsdorf of the Ministry of War.

The Ball which was to have been given tomorrow evening by His Excellency Staatsminister Graf v. Hohenthal and Bergen and the Gräfin v. Hohenthal und Bergen has been put off until Monday next the 21st instant, when it will be honoured by the presence of King Friedrich August and members of the Royal family.

This evening Verdi's four-Act opera "Violetta" will be performed, with Frau Sigrid Arnoldson in the title-rôle. The cast otherwise will be as follows: Flora, Fräulein v. d. Osten; Alfred, Herr Jäger; Germont, Herr Scheidemantel; Gaston, Herr Krämer; Baron, Herr Erwin; Marquis, Herr Nebuschka; Dr. Grenvill, Herr Büssel.—Appearances point to the probability that Frau Arnoldson will play before a sold-out house. The demand for tickets has been so active that the greater number are already sold.

A practical proof of the brilliant success achieved by Herr Burrian in New York is the fact that, after the enthusiastic reception of his performance as "Siegfried" he signed a contract for next season, guaranteeing him an honorarium of 72,000 marks (£3,600) for 24 performances.

The Tea Soirée of The Healthy and Artistic Dress Union which has its head quarters here and an influential branch in London and other European cities, is to take place at 5 p. m. on Saturday next in the concert hall of the Exhibition Palace, and claims attention. The objects of the Union are: "to promote such improvement in dress as shall make it consistent with health, comfort, activity, and graceful appearance, yet shall not involve any obvious departure from recognised conventional modes"; "to unite into one association many isolated persons who are already endeavouring to carry out improved principles in dress"; and "to promote free and constant communication between all experimenters in solving the problem of combining healthy, and at the same time artistic, dress on such broad principles as will allow the maximum of variety".

Musical performances will be a feature of the Soirée. Tickets, 1 mark each, are to be obtained at the office of this paper.

In consequence of the death of the Queen of Hanover, the Subscription Ball in the Central Theatre for the benefit of the Albert Verein has been postponed from Friday next the 18th to Tuesday the 22nd instant. Spectators' tickets already issued need not be exchanged.
