#### THE HOUSE OF COMMONS.

The Landowners (Scotland) Bill on Friday passed the third reading by 190 votes to 63. The Bill has been violently opposed by the Unionists, and it is believed that if it passes the second reading in the Upper House it will be so cut up by amendments that its fate is very uncertain. The English Land Bill, which is to be debated next week, gives less cause for differences of opinion, and is likely to be adopted by the Lords without material altera-

The sittings of the House of Commons have been very prolonged during the last ten days, and the discussion of minor Bills which the Government wishes to see passed into law before the prorogation has in consequence been much advanced. The passing of the Patent Law Bill which was down for debate on Friday evening, as well as of the Bill relating to the importation of unwholesome food, was considered practically certain. The Bill regulating the employment of women has been already passed.

#### THE MEDITERRANEAN COMMAND.

It has been decided to create a new military command in the Mediterranean, with headquarters at Malta, and Mr. Haldane on Thursday said in the House he would take this opportunity of making an announcement as to the future arrangements for the conduct of the civil and military affairs in Malta. The King had approved the Duke of Connaught being appointed as Field-Marshal Commander-in-Chief and High Commissioner for the Mediterranean. The force under His Royal Highness would comprise the garrisons at Gibraltar and Malta, with the detachments in Crete and Cyprus, and the British troops quartered in Egypt and the Soudan. As all matters of local military administration would continue to be disposed of by the Governors of Gibraltar and Malta and the general officer commanding in Egypt, His Royal Highness would be able to devote his attention to inspection and training and to the consideration of questions of strategy and defence. For the internal administration of Gibraltar and Malta the respective Governors would remain solely responsible. Similarly in Egypt and the Soudan, all civil and political matters would be dealt with as heretofore by the Agent and Consul-General in Egypt, to whom the Governor-Generals of Egypt and the Soudan would continue to be responsible. In regard to questions of policy which involved military considerations, the Field-Marshal Commanding-in-Chief and High Commissioner would be consulted by the representatives of the Foreign and Colonial Offices before they laid their views on such questions before their respective departments. He might add that the creation of this new command would cause no increase of expenditure. The date at which His Royal Highness would take up his new command was not yet definitely fixed.

#### THE DISQUIET IN BELFAST.

The strikers in Belfast endeavoured on Friday afternoon to destroy a waggon. As troops approached they were attacked with stones. The soldiers thereupon fired and charged the strikers with fixed bayonets, driving them back.

#### NEW TARIFF IN AUSTRALIA.

The new tariff which took effect on Friday provides the following rates of duties: 1 shilling per hundredweight on cement; 30 % on gloves, 25 on mineral waters, 25 on galvanised iron, 20 on cutlery and agricultural machinery, 25 to 30 on transport and mining machinery, 35 on pottery and 30 on ammunition, all on the declared value. Whether the new rate of 121/2 0/0 on pig iron will be maintained depends upon the new law providing a premium on the export of iron being passed or not.



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#### NEWS FROM AMERICA.

STRIKE OF TELEGRAPHISTS.

At Chicago the telegraphists of the Western Union Telegraph Company, whose enormous business extends over the whole of the United States, ceased work at midnight on Friday, as a protest against the discharge of an official at Los Angeles. As Chicago is the central relay point of the telegraph service throughout the country, the service to distant places is completely paralysed. In official circles it is said that this strike is only the forerunner of a great strike movement which will lead to the interruption of all telegraphic communication throughout the States and Canada.

#### THE STRIKE IN ANTWERP.

Seven handred Englishmen working in Antwerp harbour on Friday were pelted with stones by 500 strikers. The police dispersed the mob with The employers have notified to the mayor their decision not to confer with the delegates of the workmen.

#### THE KING OF SIAM.

The King of Siam arrived in Wilhelmshöhe at 4.30 on Friday and was met at the station by the Emperor. Their Majesties drove en auto to the castle where the Empress received the Eastern King. After a dinner in his honour the King of Siam was escorted by the Emperor to Kassel.

#### KINGS IN BUSINESS.

The late Mr. Cecil Rhodes once said with grim emphasis that the Kaiser is a man of business. The same tribute may be paid to his mild-looking Majesty of Siam, whose tour in Europe is concerned with various pioneering enterprises for his country's good. He is now negotiating in Germany, and says that Americans are making no end of money by exporting teak.

#### MOROCCAN AFFAIRS.

The following telegrams regarding the Moroccan

difficulty are to hand:-

Tangier: The cruiser "Forbin" arrived here from Casablanca, whence she sailed after having landed the troops, and reports that 2,000 troops have occupied the town which has been completely plundered and set on fire. The Marines lost 2 dead and 15 wounded. Quiet prevails and in spite of the condition of the town the colonists have gone ashore again and returned to their houses.

The British consul at Mazagan has asked in a wireless message for the despatch of a British steamer.

Tangier: After the bombardment of the Arabian quarter and the environs of Casablanca a battalion of the Foreign Legion was landed by Admiral Philibert, and occupied the shore. The gates and walls were then blown in by the Engineers and also occupied; whenever natives banded together they were dispersed by the guns. The S. S. "Nive" arrived on Thursday and landed 2,200 troops. The armoured cruiser "Amiral Aube" was despatched to Mazagan.

London: Reuter reports from Mogador that the news of the bombardment of Casablanca has intensified the animosity of the natives against the French. So far quiet prevails in Marakesh but disturbances are feared.

Madrid: The Minister of the Interior stated that the Government would send troops in greater numbers for the protection of Europeans.

Tangier: The Spanish S. S. "James Haynes" arrived here on Friday from Casablanca with 60 fugitives on board. They report that the bodies of the murdered Europeans had been dragged round the town and made the objects of contempt.

Toulon: Two armed transports sailed from here on Friday night with troops for Morocco.

Tangier: The French consul in Casablanca, M. Malpartny, immediately on his arrival received a letter from Mulay Hamid containing an official recognition of the justice of the French operations and asking for the co-operation of France in the punishment of the guilty.

Paris: In a lengthy cable message to M. Pichon the French representative in Tangier gives a detailed account of the wonderfully brave demeanour of the troops who on the 5th were ordered to protect the French consulate and adds that many foreigners witnessed the bravery and the presence of mind of the men and could not refrain from giving expression to their admiration.

In a cable-message to the War Minister General Drude reports the occupation of Casablanca on the 7th, which had been defended by a Marine detachment since 5 in the morning; 2 officers and 10 men were wounded and 2 men were killed.

Admiral Philibert has cabled an account of the repulse by French and Spanish Marines of the fierce attack on the consulates' quarter and reports the death of 5 sailors of the cruiser "Du Chayla" adding that the Spaniards had also had losses. The rebel tribes have suffered heavy losses. At 11 a. m. the landed detachments could not have resisted any longer in spite of the action of the guns of the "Forbin" and the "Galilée", had not four more warships arrived just then and joined in the bombardment. Then more troops were landed although there were heavy seas. The landing of war material was effected during the night with search-lights sweeping the shore. Admiral Philibert and General Drude issued a proclamation on shore manifesting the intentions of France. General Drude has encamped in the vicinity of the town. 5,000 to 6,000 horsemen attacked the camp but were driven back.

TURKEY AND PERSIA.

There are two versions of the conflict which we reported lately as having taken place on the Persian frontier near Urmia.

In Constantinople it is said that 1,500 Persian regulars with 1,000 Persian revolutionaries and 15,000 Armenians from the Caucasus who were on their way to Bitlis and Mush, attacked the Turkish camp in the disputed village Margevar which the Turks have occupied for the time being. The Turks repulsed the attack and drove the Persians back.

On the other hand the Persian version has it that a mixed Persian detachment of 1,500 troops who were on their way to fulfil the demand of the United States to punish the murderers of the American missionary Lobry, who was killed last year, and to chastise Kurd brigands, were sud-denly attacked by 4 squadrons of Hamidjeh cavalry and 4,000 Kurd irregulars with 2 batteries, under the command of a General near Tulle in the Province of Urmich. The General gave them just 3 hours in which to break up their camp. The commander of the Persian detachment asked for more time, but after 3 hours the Turks began to bombard the camp. The Persians fled, leaving several dead behind, and the Kurds plundered Tule killing 60 women and children. The Persians say that the damage suffered by them amounts to 20,000 Turkish pounds.

The Russian ambassador in Constantinople is said to be supporting the Persian claims.

According to a Reuter report the Turkish troops have not advanced further into Persian territory.

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#### LONDON LETTERS.

(From our correspondent.)

TWO INTERNATIONAL CONGRESSES. II.

London, August 7.

In my previous London Letter I have already pointed out that there is no connecting link between the International School Hygiene Congress and the International Housing Congress. But their diversity goes beyond the members attending each Congress; it extends to the public that goes to hear them speak on various subjects in the Imperial Institute and at the Caxton Hall.

This is only natural. Speaking broadly, I should say that learned people take a more active interest in the School Hygiene Congress which, highly interesting as it is, appeals necessarily to a smaller community than the International Housing Congress. School hygiene cannot, after all, be closely followed by the very many; it is too technical for that. Moreover, we are not all of us blessed with children and schoolchildren!

But housing, yes, that is a question which must interest us all, whether we are married or single, whether we have a family or not, those that think at all ought to perceive that the housing problem is one of the greatest problems of the present, and of the near future. It is, of course, realised that it is very complex, and that it becomes more complex as we attempt to solve it. John Burns showed this conclusively in the address from which I have quoted, somewhat largely, in my second London Letter on the Problem of London. The President of the Local Government Board connected the housing problem with the traffic problem. He insisted upon rapid and cheap transit. It is true that he spoke about London alone, but the housing problem in London is essentially the same housing problem which faces and baffles the reformers in every large city of Europe. Everywhere the difficulties are identical. Here in London they are merely upon a much larger scale, whereby they become intensified.





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Nor did John Burns, although he emphasised the necessity of rapid and cheap transit for the people -eulogising, as he is wont to do, the work of the London County Council in the matter of municipal tramways, and declaring himself emphatically against the L. C. C. ceasing to build extensions or joining any combination of railways, overground or underground, and of omnibus companies, with the object of raising the fares-attempt to disguise or minify the enormous other difficulties in the way of the housing reformers, here especially.

The building of model dwellings, by the municipalities or private companies and trusts, does not solve the housing problem, nor affect it much. Those model dwellings are mostly occupied immediately by people for whom they were never intended, principally by provincials who have migrated into London. Meanwhile the London "Slumlanders" do not move into them, for various reasons, and prefer to remain where they are, or to "trek" into other London "Slumlands". Education may eventually convert our "Slumlanders" to better ways, but that is a slow process, and, as the "Submerged Tenth" remains an unknown and unknowable quantity, the conversion through education may never be completed, until the Millennium

But to return à nos moutons, the International Housing Congress. This is the first time that such a Congress, which was instituted in 1889, has met in London. The present is the eighth meeting, the previous ones having been held in Paris (twice), Antwerp, Bordeaux, Brussels, Düsseldorf, and Liège. Its object is to bring together administrators and other persons interested in what is usually called the "housing of the working classes," to exchange information and ideas, and to discuss the best methods of dealing with that very important and difficult problem. The Prime Minister is honorary president, and among the honorary vice-presidents are the Archbishops of Canterbury and Westminster, the Chief Rabbi, the Chairman of the Free Church

Council, Mr. Balfour, Lord Salisbury, Lord Carring. ton, Lord Crewe, Mr. John Burns, Mr. Walter Long, the Lord Mayors of London, Liverpool, and Sheffield, the Chairman of the London County Council, the Mayor of Westminster, and other gentlemen distinguished in civic administration and social work, The official and foreign delegates are so numerous that it is impossible to give a list of names; it must suffice to mention the places represented. The Governments of Austria, France, Germany, Hungary, Italy, Russia, Spain, Belgium, Holland, Norway, Sweden, and Denmark have sent delegates, and the following Continental towns are represented:-

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It will be seen from this list, which is incomplete, that most of the great industrial and commercial centres on the Continent, and many of the smaller ones, are represented at the Congress. The very large number of German towns indicates the active and widespread interest taken in the housing question in Germany, where it is probably more acute than in any other country on account of the rapid increase of population and industrial development.

The United Kingdom is represented by the Local Government Boards of England, Scotland, and Ireland, by several county councils and London borough councils, and by the following provincial towns, together with a number of district councils:-

There are also a number of trade unions, cooperative societies, and other bodies; and among the private members are the Bishop of Birmingham, Lord Iveagh, Lord Stamford, the Archdeacon of Durham, Sir W. Chance, Sir Shirley Murphy, Mr. John W. Wilson, M.P., Mr. F. W. Verney, M.P., Mr. J. Rowlands, M.P., Mr. P. A. Molteno, M.P., Mr. John S. Nettlefold, Mr. Charles Manners, Dr. J. Clifford, and Mr. H. T. Cadbury.

The Congress is organised by the permanent committee, of which M. Lepreux is president, and by the National Housing Reform Council. The chairman is Mr. William Thompson; Mr. T. C. Horsfall, of Manchester, is vice-chairman, and Mr. Henry R. Aldridge secretary. The sittings-1 have already stated it-take place at the Cax-

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ton Hall, morning and afternoon, on the first three days in this week, the rest of the week will be devoted to visiting provincial towns, for which a special tour has been arranged. The Congress was opened Monday at 10.30 a.m. by Sir John Dickson-Poynder, M. P., who is president of the National Housing Reform Council and chairman of the Select Committee on Rural Housing, and after speeches of welcome, among which was Mr. John Burns' notable delivery, the chairman, Mr. William Thompson, gave his presidential address; in the afternoon papers were read and discussions held on (1) housing inspection-slum destruction and improvement; (2) the land question. On Tuesday the subjects were: - In the morning, (1) house building and management, (2) housing finance and taxation; in the afternoon, garden cities. On Wednesday morning, (1) town planning, (2) transit; afternoon, rural housing.

Although the Congress was not formally opened until Monday, its proceedings began on Saturday with a number of short excursions to view some of the London County Council housing schemes, the Rowton and Guinness Trust houses, and the site of the Hampstead Garden Suburb. The provincial specimens of housing to be visited later in the week include some of the municipal dwellings at Sheffield and Liverpool, Port Sunlight, and Bournville.

As above stated, the whole of Saturday was devoted to visiting housing estates and lodging houses in and around London. A party of 40 paid a visit to the site of the Hampstead garden suburb and the cottages in course of erection by the Hampstead Tenants' Society.

Here Mrs. Barnett delivered an interesting speech on the advantages of the garden suburb idea. One of the most difficult problems of the day, she said, was the bringing together of the rich and the poor. There was a tendency among the rich to extend their living areas to the west, and the poor to move in the direction of the east, with the result that there was an ever-increasing gulf between the two classes. The social wrongs which at present prevailed in this country were due to the colossal ignorance, distrust, and suspicion of the various classes. The remedy which they thought would remove these social evils was the establishment of garden suburbs, which would provide for all classes, and create a community for mutual benefit and happiness (ap-

Miss Gurney explained the scheme from a financial point of view. The Bishop of Lichfield also spoke, and expressed the hope that the movement, which had for its fundamental purpose the bringing together the classes and the masses, would expand with universal benefit.
