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THE GRAND DUKE OF BADEN.

Cologne, September 20.

A telegram published by the *Kölnische Zeitung* confirms the grave reports which were in circulation this morning of the condition of the Grand Duke of Baden. The Hereditary Grand Duke and Duchess, the journal states, arrived at Mainau yesterday. The President of the Ministry, Freiherr v. Dusch, returns today from leave of absence.

The Crown Princess of Sweden, His Royal Highness' daughter, has arrived from Borgholm, on Oland island, in Mainau.

The following bulletin was issued: *Mainau*, September 20. The improvement reported this morning in the subjective condition of His Royal Highness continues. The temperature at 1 o'clock was 37.2. The heart's action, however, is not yet satisfactory.

THE THREATENED RAILWAY STRIKE.

London, September 21.

The Secretary of the Union of Locomotive Engine Drivers has stated that the 19,000 men belonging to the Union will not take part in the contemplated strike of railway servants. It is thought that the strike will in consequence be frustrated. On the other hand strikes are threatened by the flax-spinners and the shipbuilders' model-makers in Belfast, by the weavers in Glasgow, and the shoemakers in Norwich. These rumours of coming strikes are interpreted as pointing to general dissatisfaction among the working classes.

NEWS FROM AMERICA.

MR. PIERPONT MORGAN'S CAMP RAIDED.

Mr. Pierpont Morgan, with a party of friends, is at present camping in the Adirondacks and has been enjoying some capital hunting and fishing. On Wednesday last a large catch of trout had been made and brought back to the camp, when an unexpected visit was paid thereto by a number of police, who sternly pointed out that Mr. Morgan and his friends had committed a breach of the law by taking trout in the out-season. The offenders paid over a penalty of 150 dollars on the spot.

Mr. J. Pierpont Morgan, jun., is a passenger to England by the "Teutonic", which sailed from New York on Wednesday last.

CHRISTIAN SCIENCE.

A correspondent of the *Globe* says that telegrams from Concord, New Hampshire, published in Wednesday morning's New York papers, indicate that the Christian Science leaders have made a noteworthy departure from the general practice of the Sect.

Mrs. Eddy has been authorised by them to issue a new by-law, which requires Christian Scientists to employ the services of a medical man for the purpose of ascertaining and certifying the cause of death of members of their families.

This action is directly due to the many prosecutions of Christian Scientists which have lately taken place in various States.

REPORTED SUBMARINE ERUPTION.

New York, September 19.

The correspondent of the *Sun* at Progreso (Yucatan, Mexico) states that the entire Yucatan coast, for ten miles seaward, is strewn with dead fish, presumably killed by a submarine eruption.

New York, September 19.

CANADIAN WOMEN AND MORMONISM.

Winnipeg, September 18.
The Dominion Women's Christian Temperance Convention, which is at present meeting here, has passed a resolution calling upon the Dominion Government to suppress the Mormons, who are propagating their doctrines in the country.

AMERICAN TRAINING SHIP OVERDUE.

New Orleans, September 19.
Considerable anxiety is felt as to the safety of the United States training ship "Huntress", which is already two days overdue, on a voyage from Pensacola, Florida, to New Orleans. It is greatly feared that the vessel may have suffered damage in the recent heavy storms in the Gulf of Mexico.

A GERMAN-AMERICAN TREATY.

New York, September 20.
The *Journal of Commerce* reports from Washington that a proposal for a reciprocal treaty with Germany will be laid before the Federal Senate immediately after it meets.

MUNICIPAL ADMINISTRATIONS.

Norfolk, Virginia, September 20.
In a speech delivered at the Annual Convention of the Union of American City Corporations at the Jamestown Exhibition Rear Admiral Chadwick compared American with European Municipal Administrations and described the German as the best in the world.

THE PLAGUE IN SAN FRANCISCO.

San Francisco, September 20.
Hitherto 35 cases of plague have occurred, 20 of which proved fatal. 20 suspected cases are under medical observation.

MOROCCAN AFFAIRS.

Paris, September 20.
The papers report that M. Clémenceau, the Prime Minister, in private conversation, has expressed his opinion that although peace will not directly result from the negotiations which have been begun between General Drude and the native tribes, a certain progress will prove to have been made. General Drude, who had not asked for more troops but

only for the completion of his material, had full powers to use all the means at his disposal to carry on the offensive at greater distances against the Kabyles who offered resistance.

Later in the evening M. Clémenceau declared that the situation in Morocco was unchanged, according to cable messages received. He added that Admiral Philibert in one of his despatches had complained of reports appearing in the papers to the effect that troops would be landed in all the ports. These reports, the Admiral had stated, did more than anything else to excite public opinion.

THE SITUATION IN MOGADOR.

London, September 21.
Reuter reports as to the situation in Mogador on the 17th inst.: According to the latest information Ben Omar, the governor of Sassi and of the Abda district, arrived there, as did also the Caid of the Emtrogadi district. Both are accompanied by horsemen whom they put at Mulai Hafid's disposal. Mulai Hafid, however, refuses to receive them because they did not at once join him when he asked them to. They are in camp outside the town and waiting until Mulai Hafid decides whether he will receive them or order them to return to their districts. The Caid of the Anfios and Dshiluli still refuse to recognise Mulai Hafid as Sultan. Mogador itself is loyal to Abdul Asis.

MULAI HAFID'S LETTERS.

London, September 21.

He further requests the Powers to remain neutral until it was decided to whom God would give the victory and the throne.

MULAI HAFID TO ATTACK CASABLANCA.

Paris, September 21.
A rumour is current in Tangier that El Amin, the magician chief of the "Blues", arrived in Maresk and was arrested there because Mulai Hafid distrusts him. The latter, it is said, is preparing an expedition against Casablanca which is furnished with 36 cannons and is to be under the command of Mulai Hafid's son who was called back from the Taflet district.

A considerable detachment of Shereefian troops is to leave Tangier today for Rabat. Abdul Asis is expected to arrive in Rabat at the beginning of next week.

ABDUL ASIS NEARING RABAT.

Paris, September 20.
The *Agence Havas* reports from Rabat, under date September 16, that the Governor of the town on the previous day officially informed the French Consul and the Captain of the armoured cruiser "Amiral Aube" of the imminent arrival of the Sultan. The Sultan will occupy the palace in Rabat which bears the name Sidi Mohammed Ben Abdallah and is situated on the road leading to the mines of Chellah.

RAISULI ACTIVE.

Tangier, September 20.
News comes from Larache that Raisuli's people on the 17th instant stopped post couriers who were on their way from Tangier to Larache. Fifteen

mounted men, who are said to have belonged to the Beni Aros tribe, attacked, near Djebel Hamar 4 hours' journey from Tangier, English and German post couriers who had left Djebel Hamar ahead of French couriers, handled them roughly but allowed them to continue their journey without having touched their baggage. The French courier was robbed of his cloak and money, and his despatch bag was cut to pieces; the postal matter for Rabat has disappeared and all the newspapers were torn out of their covers.

A POSSIBLE RAILWAY STRIKE.

Mr. Richard Bell, the Secretary of the Amalgamated Society of Railway Servants in England, in a speech delivered at Manchester on Sunday evening foreshadowed the possibility of a strike of railway officials which will certainly temporarily dislocate railway traffic in England. In his somewhat disingenuous speech, so characteristic of the paid agitator, Mr. Bell was fain to admit that he had until recently not been convinced that the Society had sufficient funds in hand to justify a strike, but it is more than likely that his hesitation was due to the fact that of the 222,000 railway employes not quite half belong to his society, so that although serious inconvenience may and will be caused by a strike of so many officials, there is not much likelihood of a complete paralysis of traffic. The reason for the action of the railway employes is curious in one way, seeing that the question of material improvement of their lot is merely a side issue, the real struggle being concerned with the refusal of the Railway Companies to receive the officials of the Amalgamated Society as such, although deputations of actual working railway employes are assured a hearing. It may be remembered that the same question was at issue in the great labour struggle recalled recently by the death of Lord Penrhyn. He, in his capacity as owner of valuable slate quarries, refused to receive men whom he regarded as outsiders, viz. the officials of the quarrymen's Union. Lord Penrhyn was a man of great wealth, apart from the slate quarries, and although his determined action cost him large sums of money he was in the end victorious all along the line, and he shut down his quarries until the men accepted his view of the matter.

It is well that the ultimate aims of the Society should be clearly understood. It claims recognition at the hands of the Directors i. e. it demands that when a deputation from the railway employes is received by the Directors it should be accompanied by an official of the Society who may or may not be himself an employe. When once this has been conceded it is but a step to insisting that no men should be employed who do not belong to the Society, thus introducing the worst and most tyrannical feature of Trades Unionism. The matter is one upon which the Railway Companies feel strongly, and Lord E. Hamilton for the Great Eastern Company, and Sir E. Paget, Chairman of the Midland, have made it known that neither of these Companies will tolerate for an instant any interference on the part of the Society. Nothing daunted by previous rebuffs, Mr. Bell judges in his wisdom that the present is an opportune moment for reopening the struggle. While professing to hold strikers in abhorrence he considers that there comes a time and there are circumstances that warrant the bayonet being fixed and the shot being fired.

The members of the Society are, accordingly, invited to decide by a general ballot as to whether they shall proceed to extreme measures. The Society is, undoubtedly, stronger in numbers and possessed of considerably more resources than ten years ago, when the same demand ended in failure, but the Railway Companies have not slackened their endeavours to prepare for emergencies of this nature, and though the shareholders may suffer for a time and though the traffic may be temporarily disorganised there is no reason to doubt that the ultimate victory will rest with the Companies. The only justification urged by Mr. Bell for his claim for the recognition of the Society's officials is that the Directors will feel bound to treat them very differently from mere deputations of employes. Whether this be the case or no, Mr. Bell is most unwise to ignore the circumstance that railway men are as a matter of fact in a better position than most artisans, inasmuch as, no matter what the state of trade may be, the permanence of their employment is practically guaranteed. A strike even of a few hours' duration will most certainly alienate public opinion from the strikers. The advantages of the "recognition" of the Society will not be held by the man in the street to justify the enormous inconvenience to the public at large caused by a strike of railway employes.

THE BOMB OUTRAGE AT LORD ASHTOWN.

We shall not be accused of holding a brief for the forces of disorder and disloyalty in Ireland, so that our regret may be the greater at being forced to the conclusion, by the perusal of an official report on the recent bomb outrage at Glenahira, Lord Ashtown's place, that the outrage was the work of some one in the house and not, as was suggested by Lord Ashtown, the work of the terrorist party. This statement is sufficiently grave, inasmuch as it confirms Mr. Birrell's description of some of the outrages reported from Ireland as "bogus", but as one swallow does not make a summer, so this one incident does not in any way condone the numerous outrages which are making life well-nigh impossible in several of the Irish counties.

The report in question is drawn up by the local District Inspector of Irish Constabulary, and, reading between the lines, it is impossible to avoid the belief that this officer is inclined to find the perpetrator of the outrage inside the walls of Glenahira. It appears that the explosion was caused by a metal bomb the pieces of which found in the debris proved to be portions of a metal pot measuring 16 by 12 by 10 inches. Amongst the debris were also found an iron band and an iron plate. The pot had evidently been held in position by these articles. Examination of the premises elicited the facts that the bomb had been placed on the outside sill of the drawing-room window, that at the time of the explosion this window was open and that the shutters were also unbarred and open.

Two persons who were in the house on the night of the outrage swear that at 9.30 p. m. all the windows were shut and the shutters barred. Further witnesses proved that a pot similar to that found had undoubtedly existed at Glenahira, and was used to hold whitewash. Chemical analysis of the broken pieces of the pot showed that lime adhered to all of them. Further, among the debris were found the remains of a hand-barrow which had been used presumably to bring the pot to the scene of the explosion. This barrow was identified by another witness as one belonging to Glenahira he having put in a larch handle to the barrow. There were no signs of any forcible entry having been made into the house, and the window could not have been opened from the outside unless force had been used, of which there is no trace.

Lord Ashtown has, as yet, made no comment on this report, but unless he is able to disprove its insinuations he could have dealt no shrewder blow at the cause of Unionism.

LOCAL.

The latest number, just out, of "The Modern Cicerone" series—A new English Guide to the Dresden Picture Gallery, by Professor Dr. Singer, Assistant Director of the Engravings department, with a "prefatory note" of approval and commendation by Geheimrat Woermann, the Director of the Gallery—is at first sight and on closer acquaintance a captivating pocket volume of 150 pages, illustrated on almost every page by first-class reproductions of Gallery paintings. The dainty little book seeks, says its author, "to pick out the hundred and odd paintings which may be considered most remarkable by virtue either of their intrinsic beauty or of their historic association". It is, to use the words of the Director of the Gallery in his prefatory note, "an introduction to the artistic understanding and enjoyment of the chief pictures of the collection." The pages are so full of suggestive criticism, aesthetic and technical, and so instinct with the author's spirit and love of art that to do the booklet justice would require more space than we have at command. It must suffice here to say that this truly artistic and faithful "Cicerone" should be in the pocket of every visitor to the Royal Dresden Gallery.

In the wrestling on Friday at the Central Theatre—where a practical application of the "survival of the fittest" rule is reducing the number of the competitors, so that only the *élite* of the company, representing the United States and 8 of the countries of Europe, remain—the sensation of the evening was the contest between Bech-Olsen, the Danish world-champion, and Dirk v. d. Berg of Holland, a very unequally matched pair in point of size and weight. The Hollander, a Hercules in miniature, "game" to the core and in hard condition, did wonders against his mighty adversary, showing, in addition to a most vigorous offensive, astonishing skill and power of resistance. The issue was still undecided at the end of a lively half-hour; the men meet again on Monday evening. Petroff, champion of Bulgaria, defeated Austria's champion, Randolfi, in neat style, in a short bout of 4 1/4 minutes; and Pierrard, the French "Colosse" overpowered Paxon, the German American, without much trouble in 8 minutes.

The fixtures for today and Monday are: This afternoon, Romanoff, Russia, v. Randolfi, Austria; Paxon, German American, v. Sauerer, Bavaria; this evening, Pierrard, France, v. Romanoff, Russia; Petroff, Bulgaria, v. Sauerer; Antonitch, Serbia, v. Bech-Olsen, Denmark; on Monday evening, besides v. d. Berg and Bech-Olsen as above stated, Jackson, Scotland, v. Sturm, Berlin; Romanoff, Russia, v. Sauerer.

The exhibition of the works of Gyula Tornai, the Buda Pesth artist, with which the art *salon* of Emil Richter, Prager Strasse 13, opens its autumn exhibition season, has proved to be a very happy hit, and attracts the lively interest of all circles. The collection, which is exhibited for the first time in Germany, comprises about 65 paintings from Japan and India, which show in great detail especially the former country with its ancient worship and religious life, its manners and customs. By his great capacity and excellent *technique* the artist has succeeded in reproducing with full effect the gay colours and luxuriant blooms of Japan, its richly ornamental architecture and splendid vestures; while giving to each work a harmonious and artistic unity and finish. Not only will all who know Japan and India be greatly interested in viewing the exhibition, but those who wish to acquire an intimate knowledge of these characteristic countries will find the collection well fitted to afford them information. Negotiations are in progress for the sale of several of the works, and it is likely that they will pass into the hands of private owners in Dresden.

FASHION.

"What shall I wear?" "What shall I buy?" are questions to which a recent publication supplies many answers. The capricious goddess Fashion has decreed that for this autumn a *mode* calling itself Japanese shall take all *ateliers* by storm. With this new "yellow danger", we learn on high authority, ladies who wish to be *chic* and modern will have to make terms. A good guide to the mysteries of the Japanese *mode* is the publication referred to—the latest edition of the *Mode-Bericht* (Report of Fashions), of Adolf Renner, Dresden, a profusely illustrated catalogue, the professed purpose of which is to explain and exhibit in the plainest way the newest models in the best styles.

In the first pages of this elaborate and ornamental compilation we come upon a whole series of novelties in costumes, adapted to the needs and wishes of all classes of purchasers. The health-enthusiast, the devotee of the "goddess", the seeker after the substantial and durable, will find that careful consideration for their requirements has guided the compilers in their work. The good taste that inclines to the new and newest yet insists on utility and rejects superfluous ornament, will meet with something to admire on almost every page, whether in the mantles and jackets department, the blouses and skirts, ladies' hats, morning dresses, or children's frocks—or in the firm's oldest and special branch, dress materials. Further, there are numerous illustrations of linen, curtains, carpets and upholsterer's stuffs. Nicely got up views of interiors show the effect and method of employing modern small-patterned furnishing and artistic fabrics. Here we are transported to the *foyer* of the Royal Opera during a *Pause*, that we may admire lovely evening toilettes, there to the corridors of the Royal Schauspielhaus and Residenz Theater, where the newest models of evening mantles are paraded. Again, on the steps of the Central Theater after the close of the performance we see types of costumes. On the Altmärktpromenade, during the military band concert on Sunday mornings, and in familiar streets and squares of the city the most modern autumn and winter novelties are presented to us. Groups—such as a young ladies' school in front of the Café Kreuzkamm, neat skating figures on the rinks, charming scenes of school-children in the Georg Platz and by the Kreuzschule—pen drawings interspersed among the coloured illustrations, and above all the explanations in the text, have transformed this Catalogue from a dry Fashion Dictionary into an original Guide to the Fashions that is well worth seeing and reading.
