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THE KAISER'S VISIT.

London, October 12.

The gold casket in which the address of welcome is to be presented to His Majesty the German Emperor on the occasion of his visit to the Guildhall on the 13th of November is ornamented with costly precious stones. The front bears the Emperor's coat of arms in diamonds and emeralds. Views of the Guildhall and the Mansion House, and four chased figures representing Sculpture, Music, Painting, and Literature, are disposed round and on the casket, which also bears the arms of the City of London. On the lid are inscribed the monograms of the Emperor and Empress, and the word "Welcome!". The City Corporation has appropriated £1,300 for the reception at the Guildhall.

THE ENGLISH RAILWAY CRISIS.

THE LABOUR UNIONS' PLANS.

The following circular has been issued:—"In the event of the reply of the railway directors to the application of the railway servants being in the negative, the Trades Union Parliamentary Committee, the Labour party, and the General Federation of Trades Unions will meet in joint conference, to consider what action is necessary.—Signed, "W. C. Steadman (Secretary of the Parliamentary Committee of the Trades Union Congress). "J. Ramsay Macdonald (Secretary of the Labour party). "Allen Gee (Acting on behalf of the General Federation)."

MR. BELL SUPPORTED BY TRADE UNIONISTS.

In an interview with a London News Agency representative, Mr. W. C. Steadman, M. P. (Secretary to the Parliamentary Committee), who was one of the signatories to the communication to the Press, given above, said that their principal object in making their intentions known at this juncture, before the railway companies met, was to make it evident to the companies that Mr. Bell was being supported by the whole of the Trade Unionists of the country. "I may say," Mr. Steadman added, "that our committee alone represents 1,700,000, and the general federation has a very large membership, while we have the support of the whole Labour Party in the House of Commons. I suppose we should first call a conference of the various committees, who would have full power to act in conjunction." In the event of a strike, Mr. Steadman said, the A.S.R.S. would have the financial support of English Trade Unionism generally.

THE NEW ADMIRALTY PIER.

London, October 12.

The *Tribune* says that the Admiralty have given orders for the construction of new works for the fortification of the Admiralty Pier at Dover, which will cost £10,000,000.

THE UNREST IN INDIA.

GOVERNMENT MEASURES.

Simla, October 11.

In consequence of recent events, the Government is taking steps to prevent disorderly assemblies. The Provincial authorities are to be empowered to prohibit public meetings except with written permission. Infringements of the regulation are to be punishable with fine and imprisonment.

St. Petersburg, October 11.

General French is to witness the manoeuvres of the infantry and cavalry, as well as those of the artillery of

ORIENTAL IMMIGRATION.
SPEECH BY MR. RUDYARD KIPLING.

Victoria, October 9.

Mr. Rudyard Kipling was the guest of the Canadian Club at a luncheon given today, and afterwards delivered an address to 600 representative townspeople.

Mr. Kipling said he had been received everywhere in Canada with the greatest kindness, and was filled with regret at the thought of the thousands in England who could not enjoy the great heritage which the Dominion offered them. The time had arrived when Canadians must choose between men and women of their own race, with an instinctive

respect for British laws and institutions, and Orientals, who, more or less, regarded laws as a means of oppression. The question could not be dallied with, and must be settled now.

Mr. Kipling's sentiments were heartily applauded.

THE PHILIPPINES.

Mr. Taft's declaration at Shanghai with regard to the policy of the Government towards the Philippines, and in the Far East generally, says the New York correspondent of the *Globe*, is considered of the highest importance, and as indicating that the will of the majority is to prevail. Mr. Taft's statement clearly shows that the views expressed in these messages, indicating that, despite the strong opposition manifested in some quarters to the retention of the Philippines, the majority of the administration, responding to the bulk of public opinion, is in favour of the islands remaining in the possession of the United States were correct.

Another view, expressed in previous messages, finds confirmation today in a cable from Manila, which states that most of the influential Filipinos themselves are in favour of the continuance of the American occupation on commercial grounds. They declare that the removal of the United States' naval and military forces would result in a serious diminution of the number of customers for the Philippines. Opinion among British, German, and even Spanish residents and merchants is also against either the restoration of the islands to the Filipinos or their cession to another Power.

THE HAGUE CONFERENCE.

THE ARBITRATION SCHEME.

The Hague, October 11.
At a sitting of the Commission, the scheme for an International Arbitration Court, on being put to the vote, was opposed by nine States, including three of the Powers, while three States, including two of the Powers, refrained from voting; the scheme was, therefore, rejected. In order to arrive at an understanding without sacrificing the principles which prompted the opposition, a consultation was held this morning between M. Nelidoff, the President of the Conference, and Baron von Marschall, M. Bourgeois, Baron von Mery, Sir Edward Fry, Count Tornielli and the Marquis de Soveral, with the result that the following resolution was introduced at the evening sitting of the first Commission: In the spirit of mutual understanding and compromise which is essential to a Peace Conference, the Commission has agreed to place the following resolution before the delegates, which, while completely respecting the standpoint of every State as expressed in the voting, at the same time gives them an opportunity of stating those principles which are to be considered as universally admitted.

The Commission is agreed, firstly, in acknowledging the principle of compulsory arbitration; secondly, in establishing that certain disagreements respecting the interpretation and application of international treaties should be submitted to compulsory arbitration. Finally, it asserts that if an agreement in this sense was not immediately possible, the differences of opinion had never overstepped points of legal controversy, and that during the four months' labours all the States of the world had not only learnt to understand and approach one another, but in the course of their long and united exertions there had shown itself a strong feeling of solidarity in the interests of the human race. This resolution was carried by forty votes. Four States refrained from voting.

A plenary sitting of the Conference will be held on Tuesday, at which the resolutions of the first Commission will in all probability be finally determined. The Conference is expected to end its sittings a few days later.

THE AUSTRIAN EMPEROR.

Vienna, October 11.
The Wiener Fremdenblatt writes as follows: The reports from Schönbrunn give a very favourable view of the Emperor's condition. Almost the whole of yesterday was spent by the Emperor in his study, according to his usual habit when in good health, and in the afternoon he received the second Comptroller of the Household Count von Montenuovo, who placed several documents before him. Until five o'clock, the hour of dinner, His Majesty was at his writing-table. He took dinner in the usual way. In the

evening Professor Neusser and Hofrat Kerzl made a thorough examination of His Majesty, with the satisfactory report that the catarrh had not spread, but that it had on the contrary begun to abate, so that a slight improvement may be anticipated. His Majesty's condition was somewhat aggravated by the cough and the raised temperature which prevailed throughout the day. He feels a little tired and overstrained, his appetite is not quite as good as usual, but these discomforts are disappearing. His Majesty retired to rest at his accustomed time, 8 o'clock. Refreshing sleep, broken somewhat by coughing, followed.

Vienna, October 11.

According to the latest intelligence, there is no cause for anxiety, although catarrhal symptoms and slight feverishness continue.

Another telegram states that His Majesty's disorder is taking the normal course. His appetite is slight, and his spirits at times low. Inhalations have had a good effect, and the cough is easier. The Kaiser telephones twice daily from Schönbrunn to make inquiries.

Vienna, October 12.

The Fremdenblatt writes: "According to information which has reached us from Schönbrunn, no material change took place in the Emperor's condition in the course of yesterday. His Majesty again received both his Aides-de-Camp General and the head of the Cabinet Chancery. In the afternoon the Comptroller of the Court, Prince v. Montenuovo, attended and made his report. In all three cases, however, the Emperor refrained from speaking. His Majesty remained in his study until nearly 5 o'clock, and then dined, but, as in the last few days, with little apparent appetite. At 7 o'clock in the evening Professor Neusser and the Emperor's Physician, Dr. Kerzl, were received by His Majesty for a consultation. We are glad to be able to state that the catarrhal symptoms had not increased during the day, though slight rise of temperature had not abated in the evening. The fits of coughing were less frequent and the Emperor consequently felt a little better. His Majesty retired to rest at the usual hour, and the customary daily routine was only so far altered that the walk in the morning was omitted, and the Emperor remained in his apartments."

DISORDER IN MILAN.

Milan, October 11.

As some of the "black legs" were taken to the station today after their work with the Gas Company, they were stoned by workmen from neighbouring factories. A workman was wounded and many windows were broken. The military who attempted to quell the disorder were also stoned, and thereupon opened fire. Three workmen were wounded, one severely. A number of houses have ceased work, including the Gas Company. The service of trains has also been discontinued.

Tonight there was no light in the streets except where electric light was available. The Gasworkers' strike has been resumed. The executive committee of the Trades Unions here has resolved to proclaim a general strike.

The earlier departure of General Liauthey is connected with the continuance of the movement of the tribes round Ujdja. Fifty African sappers have meanwhile been sent from Tlemcen to the French Algerian frontier.

THE ANTWERP STRIKE.

A RENEWAL FEARED.

Antwerp, October 11.

A fresh outbreak of the strike is imminent. Today the labourers engaged in grain-lading again left their work because they had not received the rise of 50 centimes promised by the Burgomaster. At a meeting of the dock-labourers, the Socialist leader Chapelle urged them to return to their work, explaining that he would allow the authorities till Tuesday to decide on the matter. If, by that time, a rise was not forthcoming, the strike would be resumed. In that case, according to the statement of the Maritime Federation, a complete lock-out would immediately take place.

A GENERAL STRIKE IN MILAN.

Milan, October 12.

The general strike has been proclaimed, and work is at a stand-still in consequence in the large industrial concerns. The street tram-cars have ceased running. Although almost all the railway men have struck, it was possible to despatch the express train from Venice to Turin and the train to the North, so that they could arrive at the scheduled time. Some of the smaller establishments are still at work, and ordinary carriage traffic continues. The shops are open. Public feeling is excited, but order prevails.

THE PERSIAN CONSTITUTION.

London, October 12.

A newspaper report from Teheran dated yesterday states that the Constitution signed by the Shah limits the prerogative of the Throne and the power of the priesthood; guarantees freedom of conscience and education, the liberty of the person and of the Press, the right of meeting and freedom of speech; and defines the rights of Parliament and the responsibility of Ministers. According to the same telegram, the Parliament has in view the confiscation of certain lands belonging to political personages, and will compel the high Court officials to contribute £ 400,000 to the National Bank, over which a Frenchman has been called to preside.

KING ALFONSO'S VISIT TO VIENNA.

It is announced from Madrid that owing to the indisposition of the Emperor of Austria, the visit of the King and Queen of Spain to Vienna has been postponed.

LONDON LETTER.

(From our correspondent.)

"OULD OIRELAND FORIVER" IN LONDON.

London, October 7th.

The Gaelic League of Dublin has been at work fifteen years. The secretary of the London Branch, one of the most energetic and one of the most prosperous of the fairly numerous Branches, tells us an interesting fact in one of his several circulars, which were spread out before me amid a mass of other Gaelic League literature at his own stall in the Royal Horticultural Hall, Vincent Square, Westminster, where the annual Irish Fair is being held there under the auspices of the Gaelic League.

The "bonachs"—as rabid Gaels will persist in calling their Fairs wherever held—are nothing unusual. But this one had two distinct features, all the same, which distinguished it from its predecessors, at least in our own "village".

In the first place, it must be regarded as an answer to what the Irish Nationalists, whether Sinn Fein or not, have persistently described the so-called International Exhibition at Dublin. This, they say, was an entirely English undertaking, financed and worked by Englishmen, not for the benefit of Irishmen—who indeed have boycotted it all along, since the very opening day when the King and Queen honoured the ceremony with their presence—but for their own ends. The Irish Nationalists maintain that no true Hibernian has had anything to say to the so-called International Dublin exhibition.

Now this "Bonach" at Westminster was one of the Irish Nationalist counterblasts on a small scale, no doubt, to the "International Humbug" at Dublin. It was absolutely Irish from its inception to all its details. The organisers were Irish, so were all the stall-holders, and all the exhibitors of bacon, butter and eggs, honey and fruit, leather and woollen articles, of paper and books, beer and poteen, boots, gloves and hosiery. Then there were the actors and artists in the concert-room, adjacent to the great exhibition hall. They, too, were all "true blue" Irishmen and Irishwomen, singing and dancing in their national garbs all those Irish things for which the Green Isle is ever famous, or performing the Irish dramas and comedies, not always Gaelic, it is true, but still absolutely "genuine" products of "Ould Oireland".

There was more to make this "bonach" original and distinctive, it being the first one in which the Irish Agricultural Department, organized by Sir Horace Plunkett and at present presided over by Mr. T. W. Russell, has joined hands with the Gaelic League.

This was, indeed, an Irish victory, though a bloodless one. I will add that the most rabid Sassenach could have no serious conscientious objection to an Irish exhibition of this kind since it tended to illustrate two facts: firstly, that the material progress of Ireland has been remarkable in recent years; secondly, that industrial Irishmen and agricultural Irishmen are well able to hold their own, and could bring to market Irish products and Irish manufactured articles of as good a quality and at as reasonable prices, as those of other countries, England included.

What is still more satisfactory to record is that the demand for Irish produce is steadily on the increase. The value of Irish butter exported in 1905, according to the latest figures available, amounted to the considerable total of £ 3,357,000, which was an increase of £ 160,000 on the previous year. It is interesting to note that Ireland's export of eggs to Great Britain is greater than that of any other country except Russia. It sends annually to England and Scotland about one thousand million eggs, the value of which for 1905 was £ 2,515,000, as against

Other exhibits included a display of Irish home-spuns, varied assortments of delicate pointed Irish lace, examples of Irish linen and hosiery, and very artistic poker-work from the Belfast decorative associations.

Here, as elsewhere with Irish things, there were drawbacks in that political feeling has not been absent, although I quite believe in the sincerity of many protestations, continually heard at the Royal Horticultural Hall, that the "bonach" was absolutely non-political. I suppose that *c'est plus fort qu'eux* politics loom large everywhere, and Sinn Fein was very much to the fore in Vincent Square, for everybody knows that the Gaelic League is one of the most powerful factors in the Sinn Fein movement. But it is quite honest at least to pretend the contrary, and to maintain that Sinn Fein and Irish Nationalism have nothing whatever to do with the "bonachs".

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THE RUSSIAN DISORDERS.

A telegram from Lodz states that an armed band attacked a military patrol on Friday. In the conflict, a soldier and two of the aggressors were killed, while several persons were wounded. The incident caused a panic.

ARCTIC STEAMER WRECKED.

SIXTEEN LIVES LOST.

Copenhagen, October 10.

A telegram from Seydisfjord (Iceland) states that at 10 p. m., on Saturday last, the s. s. Fridtjof, from Tromsø (Capt. Larsen), was lost off Cape Langanes. The steamer had been injured by floating ice, and was making for Iceland for safety.

Fifteen of those on board were drowned. The engineer clung to a plane, on which he drifted to land and was saved. So far eight bodies have been washed ashore.

A *Central News* telegram states that the Fridtjof was employed in connection with Wellman's balloon party during their stay at Spitzbergen, and that 16 lives were lost.

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The Autumn season is in full swing now both as regards day and evening garments. Many smart costumes can be seen in the streets and at the Opera. During the pause at the performance of "Don Juan" on Wednesday night I noticed some pretty frocks in the foyer. One, a graceful gown of soft creamy material, was trimmed on the skirt with two wide rows of thick eluny lace. The bodice was made in the kimono style which looks so well for evening wear, the handsome lace forming the short, wide upper sleeves and the cross-over part of the bodice. The under sleeves were made of the same soft clinging material as the skirt and finished with wide cuffs of the lace below the elbow. Another charming gown which could well be worn in day-time was of soft silk, accordion pleated from the waist, and inserted with five or six rows of lace in a zig-zag form reaching from hem to waist. I heard that several of these pretty gowns had been made at the firm of Adolf Renner in the Altmarkt and I am sure a call at this establishment would result in satisfaction.

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LOCAL.

One of the familiar resorts of Dresden—the Ernst Arnold art-gallery, Schloss Straße 34, which was built last year and has since been the scene of many important exhibitions of pictures—has now been extended by the erection of a lofty hall lighted from above, with a new entrance corridor and several ante-rooms. In order to ensure that the added building should be of an artistic character and at the same time in harmony with the original plan, the architectural work was placed in the hands of Professor Wilhelm Kreis. The new gallery was inaugurated yesterday by the opening, under the patronage of H. R. H. Prince Johann Georg, of an exhibition of works by modern Viennese artists, comprising oil paintings, water-colours, etchings, and sculpture. The exhibition of Viennese art itself is interesting and distinguished in a high degree. It is impossible to give even a general idea of the work shown, but we may say that one carries away the impression of a spirit thoroughly

modern yet also thoroughly dignified and sane. Examples and exceptions we must deal with in a subsequent issue.

The lecture will be followed on Thursday, at the same hour by a visit to the Albertinum (sculpture Gallery) for illustration by originals and fine casts. This course on Greek art may well serve as a preparation for a tour in Greece and Sicily.

On Wednesday, at the same time and place, will be held the second lecture of the course in Modern Art, which will be devoted to the masters of the School of Barlizon, the French Landscape painters, Corot, Rousseau etc., and illustrated by prints and photographs.

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A performance of sacred music will be given in the Roman Catholic part of the Garrison Church, Dresden-Albertstadt, on Sunday October 20 at 4.30 p. m. Admission free.

At the Central Theatre today there will be two performances: in the afternoon, 3.30, at reduced prices, and at 8 o'clock in the evening at the usual prices. All the artistes engaged for the month will appear in the afternoon as well as at the evening performance. The ticket office is open all day after 11 a. m.
