THE KAISER'S VISIT TO ENGLAND.

KING EDWARD INSPECTS PREPARATIONS.

King Edward drove down on Friday by automobile to Windsor, and there inspected the various arrangements that are in progress for the reception of their Majesties the Emperor and Empress of Germany.

THE RAILWAY CRISIS IN ENGLAND.

After an interview with the representatives of the Railway Companies, the President of the Board of Trade issued an official notification that the negotiations had been adjourned, in order that the representatives might further enquire into the questions which had been discussed.

INDIAN RAILWAY ACCIDENT.

EIGHT KILLED.

Lahore, October 24.

Eight persons have been killed and twenty injured in a collision between a Delhi-Lahore passenger train and a goods train.

ENGLISH MOTORIST SENTENCED.

IMPRISONMENT AND £720 FINE.

The trial took place at Liège on Wednesday of Mr. William Rowland, an English motorist, who was charged with having caused the death of a servant girl named Meurmans, at Liège on June 11 last. Mr. Rowland at the time was staying with friends at Aywaille, a small town near Spa, and had driven himself into Liège in his car. In the Boulevard d'Avroy the car knocked the girl down, and she was so badly injured that she died almost immediately. It was alleged that the car was being driven at an excessive speed, having regard to the traffic in the thoroughfare, and that due care was not exercised. Mr. Rowland, however, asserted that the affair was an accident pure and simple, and that he knocked the girl down while endeavouring to avoid a collision with an electric car. The court found accused guilty, and he was sentenced to one year's imprisonment. He was further ordered to pay a sum of £720 in damages.

ACCIDENT TO A LINER.

New York, October 25.

According to a wireless despatch from the North German Lloyd S.S. "Kaiser Wilhelm der Grosse", the steering gear of the vessel was damaged at sea, so that it is necessary to steer by the screws.

THE KAISER'S GIFT.

A HOLIDAY AT WESTPOINT.

Instruction at West Point Military Academy was suspended on Thursday upon the occasion of the presentation of the bust of H. M. the Kaiser. The German Military Attaché at Washington, Major Koerner, made the presentation and gave a speech, in which he stated that the bust was presented by the Kaiser as an expression of his high esteem and friendship for the American army, and with the wish that it would constitute a further bond of sympathy between the two armies, which are already bound by ties of blood. Colonel Scott, the principal of the academy, received the bust and General Grant spoke as representative of the Secretary of War, Mr. Taft. The General stated that the gift was appreciated by the War Department as a mark of honour, and would act as an incentive to the young American soldier. The presentation was preceded by a parade of the cadets.

CHINESE CHARGE D'AFFAIRES "HELD UP."

Chen Ko Shen, Chinese Chargé d'Affaires in London, had an unusual experience on landing here from the White Star liner "Cedric," says the *Central News* New York correspondent. Although he explained in fluent English who and what he was, producing a passport bearing his photograph, in view of the Chinese exclusion laws, Mr. Shen was refused permission to land pending the arrival of the inspector from the Chinese Inspection Office, and had to wait half an hour in his state room for this functionary. It subsequently transpired that a telegram announcing his arrival had been late in arriving, and he was not expected.

A State administrator for the Union Trust Co. has been appointed in Providence, Rhode Island. The New York Borough Bank in Brooklyn, with a capital of 200,000 dollars and three millions deposits remained closed on Friday.

ANGLO-GERMAN CONFERENCE.

IMPORTANT AGREEMENT.

At the conference which is being held at Hamburg to bring about the mutual recognition of the English and German free-board regulations, and which consists of eight delegates of each country, a complete agreement was reached as to such mutual recognition. The new regulations are to apply to ships whose keels are laid on and after the 1st of January 1909; their application to old ships will be optional. Ships laid down before the 1st January 1909 are to have the old free-board. The agreement is subject to the approval of the two Governments.

LONDON LETTER.

Following upon the airship's detour of St. Paul's dome, many newspaper columns were filled with horrific forecasts of sanguinary combats in un-

substantial ether, and the obliteration of whole army corps by a devastating deluge of explosives from on high. Mr. Le Queux was understood to be hastily preparing a revised version of his prophetic ebullition, and the somnolence of the Hague Conference was in imminent danger of a rude awakening to the exigency of inhibiting the use of aerial weapons, at least until such time as each of the other Powers were in possession of a "Nulli Secundus". Under the circumstances, therefore, it is not surprising that this immense and weighty responsibility proved too oppressive for the luckless balloon's flimsy structure, and her meteoric flight ended ignominiously at Sydenham, almost before the echoes of enthusiastic plaudits had ceased to vibrate. We are assured, however, that "dirigible No. 1", as she is officially styled, is not permanently out of the running, and Phoenix-like, will shortly rise from the dust and ashes of her present ill-repute to higher flights than ever. As, therefore, her case is *sub judice*, we shall refrain from further criticism until she has had another chance.

HAGUE RHETORIC.
The Hague Conference has at length succumbed to the effects of senile decay. Since the inaugural address,—how many weary months ago,—the assembly never seemed to take itself seriously, and divesting the long drawn out proceedings of the mass of florid rhetoric that served *pour passer le temps*, it would be difficult to lay a finger on any concrete reform accomplished. The compensating feature of the affair, however, is that this barren result proves a disappointment to no one, since all the world regarded the solemn farce only as a concession to the dreamers of ethical visions. With the sterile aftermath of the first Conference so vividly in memory, the amazing optimism which brought its successor into being is not easy to comprehend. The limitation of armaments clause, which really constituted the alpha and omega of the affair, was segregated at the outset, and consequently there remained nothing of universal interest to impart vitality into the proceedings. Certain vague attempts have been made to limit some of the elasticities of International Law, but these have apparently proved practically abortive.

Some interesting statistics are to hand which clearly demonstrate that the delegates were not unmindful of the inner man, although one would imagine that long hours spent in fruitless endeavour to unravel abstruse technicalities were not conducive to hearty appetite. During the four months which the Conference lasted no fewer than 317 dinners were given in honour of the delegates, the total bill for which amounts to £104,720. Another heavy item is for telegrams, which cost well over £225,000.

The play, however, is lacking in artistic merit and does not give real scope to Mdme. Bernhardt's splendid talent. Tonight she appears in "La Dame aux Camélias" which is an old and trusty friend. The great actress is supported by a most able company, who are, perhaps, rather unfairly overshadowed by the proximity of their distinguished colleague. But this is the inevitable lot of those who follow after greatness.

which the British forces laboured during that conflict are none the less welcome because they are a trifle belated. It is impossible to deny that considerable irritation was felt by the English nation at the numerous attacks made by irresponsible Continental journals upon this country's

policy. Boer victories were eulogised and magnified to an absurd degree, while, on the other hand, much rancour was exhibited towards the British Army. Thoughtful Englishmen, however, always doubted official inspiration of these malicious diatribes, although they undoubtedly did much to foment international illfeeling. It is now publicly stated by the supreme military critics of the world, since it is understood that the review in question was written in the department of the German General Staff, that the achievements of the British Army were of a high order, and that upon numerous occasions, the English "Tommy" gave eloquent testimony of his pluck and devotion. Coming from such a source, such eulogy is praise indeed, and will do much to promote amicable relations between two countries whose interests are almost identical, save in the somewhat tortuous imaginations of splenetic journalists.

Oberon's servant Puck, wandering to find what his master needs, hears of Hüon of Bordeaux who, having slain Charlemagne's son in a duel, has been ordered to go to Bagdad to slay the favourite sitting on the Caliph's left and to wed the Caliph's daughter, Rosia. Puck makes Hüon and Rosia see each other in a vision and fall in love with each other. Oberon gives the former a magic horn and to his esquire, Scherasmin, a magic cup. Rosia is to marry Babekan, but she has hated him ever since she saw Hüon in her dream. Fatima, her maid, hears of Hüon's arrival in Bagdad. At the beginning of the second act the Caliph is about to celebrate his daughter's nuptials, but Hüon, recognising Rosia as the maiden of his dream, kills Babekan. The Turks attack him, but Scherasmin remembers the horn in time and on his blowing it, Oberon transports the lovers to the sea shore where, together with Scherasmin and Fatima, they embark on a ship. Oberon, to make trial of their mutual love in adversity, bids Puck raise the spirits of the storm. They are shipwrecked. Rosia is captured by pirates and Hüon, attempting to rescue her, is wounded and left senseless on the beach. Scherasmin and Fatima are sold as slaves to the Emir of Tunis. Hüon has been thrown into a magic sleep by Oberon and, on waking after seven days, finds himself in the Emir's garden. Fatima discovers that Rosia is in the Emir's harem. Hüon receives a message bidding him come to the myrtle tower at night, but is horrified to find the lady who meets him is Roschana, the Emir's wife, who has fallen in love with him. The Emir discovers the pair and orders Hüon to be burnt and Roschana to be drowned. Rosia begs for Hüon's life, but the Emir will not listen and orders her to be burnt with her lover. 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DRESDEN: LOCAL.

Mr. T. St. John Gaffney, the American Consul-General at Dresden leaves for Scotland on Monday next for the opening of the pheasant shooting, where he will be the guest of Sir Henry Ballantyne at his shooting lodge at Minden near Edinburgh.

At the Central Theatre today, Sunday, there will be two performances: the first at 3.30 p. m. at reduced prices, the second at 8 o'clock in the evening at the usual prices. All the lady and gentlemen artists, without exception, who have been engaged at the theatre during the month will appear at each of the two performances. The ticket office will be open all day from 11 a. m.

Die Gesellschaft zur Förderung der Dresdner Musikschule gave a Beethoven concert on Thursday evening, as the first of its year's concerts in the Vereinshaus. All the pieces on the programme were performed by teachers of the institution, or by the pupil orchestra. Fräulein Maria Schaff—whose powerful but not yet fully cultivated mezzosoprano voice is at times marred by a throaty quality of tone—sang a number of songs, among which the "Schottische Lieder", accompanied by pianoforte, violin, and 'cello were very much applauded. The Trio in D op. 70—called the "Geistertrio", from the weirdly mysterious second movement—was not heard to its fullest effect in the large hall; but it was played by Herren Möbius, Mayerosch, and Zenker with much taste and clearness, even if the first and last movements were overhurred. The assistance of Herr Weinreich, of Leipsic, had been secured as solo pianist, and he played the grand E-flat Concerto with a sure feeling for style but not altogether faultless technique. The lion's share of the evening's success was gained by Herr Naumann, who fulfilled with great skill and energy the troublesome and trying task of leading an unsteady orchestra in an artistic style. That the Symphony in A, and the orchestral accompaniment to the pianoforte Concerto above referred to, were played in a very praiseworthy manner, was entirely due to him, and none the less so because the horns and wood-wind instruments sometimes failed to carry out his intentions.—"Ultra posse nemo obtinetur".—M. N.

NEWS FROM FRANCE.

A TOULON SENSATION.—NAVAL OFFICER ARRESTED.

A midshipman named Ulmo was arrested in Toulon on Thursday on suspicion of espionage and treason, and for having stolen a signal book and code. Ulmo has already made a full confession. It is reported that he wrote an anonymous letter to the Minister of Marine and offered certain documents for 150,000 francs, and in case of refusal threatened to sell them to a foreign government. The Minister wrote accepting the offer and the midshipman appointed the time and place for handing over the papers. A warrant officer was deputed to receive the papers and Ulmo threatened him with a revolver. The culprit was speedily disarmed and captured. He stated that he needed money to satisfy the wishes of his sweetheart.

A YELLOW BOOK ON MOROCCO.

The *Petit Parisien* publishes a short summary of the yellow book on Morocco prepared by the Minister of Foreign affairs, M. Pichon, and to be laid before the chamber of Deputies.

THE ARTIFICIAL DIAMONDS.

The commission appointed by the Academie des Sciences to test the diamond crystals produced by the chemist Charette by electro-chemical means, has proved that they do not possess the properties of diamonds in any way. The crystals melt at a temperature of 200 degrees centigrade and are organic products, the constituents of which are similar to those of naphthalin.

THE EARTHQUAKES IN ITALY.

PROMPT RELIEF TO THE SUFFERERS.

The King of Italy has given 100,000 lire for the victims of the earthquake catastrophe in Calabria. The Minister of War has ordered the despatch of more troops, with mules and materials. A ton of bread will be sent by the Government to the distressed districts every day. The Prime Minister has instructed the Director General of Public Health to send to Reggio two Red Cross detachments, ten waterproof tents sufficient to shelter several hundred people, and the requisite medical and surgical stores. With the help of the officials and troops despatched by the Government it is already possible to proceed with the establishment of places of refuge and with the work of clearing the damaged houses.

MOROCCAN AFFAIRS.

RENEWED FIGHTING.

London, October 25.

According to reports from Gibraltar published in the newspapers, Mulai Hafid made an attack yesterday evening on Mogador. The French warships "Amiral Aube" and "Desaix" opened fire and inflicted heavy losses on the assailants. Reinforcements for the garrison of over 1,000 men sent by the Sultan Abdul Asiz were landed from the transport steamer "Artois".
