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## BERLIN

In remembrance of her visit, which she recently paid to the American Church on Motz Strasse, the Empress has presented the church library with a copy of an interesting work published some months ago, viz. the first part of Queen Victoria's letters, in three volumes. This work has been published after King Edward himself had carefully selected the letters written by or to his mother. Beginning with her childhood they cover the period up to the year of 1861, inclusive. In her accompanying letter the Empress states that she was greatly pleased with everything she had seen in the American Church, and that she will continue to take great interest in the welfare of the church.

The Exhibition of Old English Masterworks in the Royal Academy of Arts, Pariser Platz 4, is so crowded every day that the management was compelled to raise the admission fee for Sunday to five marks, instead of two marks. But on week-days the regular price of two marks will be maintained. Last Friday the Crown Prince and the Crown Princess visited the exhibition.

Just in time for the big American Minstrel Show, which is to help to finance the American Benevolent Fund, the Board of Management have published their annual report to show the working and the needs of this fund. The financial status is as follows: including last year's balance of  $\text{M} 2,075$  the total receipts during the last calendar year amounted to  $\text{M} 7,031.28$ ; the main item being subscriptions to the amount of  $\text{M} 3,227.25$ . The expenses were  $\text{M} 4,900.90$  spent for relieving people in distress,  $\text{M} 499.5$  for general running expenses, and  $\text{M} 1,500$  which were invested as a sinking fund.

The working of this committee cannot be better described than in their own words. The report says on that subject:

"The foundation-idea of this Fund was to raise, at the beginning of each year, by voluntary subscriptions from among American business-houses and American individuals temporarily or permanently resident here, an amount of money large enough to relieve all worthy cases of Americans in distress in Berlin during the year. You will be surprised to learn that subscriptions in 1907 were made by only 86 persons and firms—a figure out of all proportion to the total number. We therefore not only earnestly invite last year's subscribers to renew their subscriptions for 1908, but to induce their friends and acquaintances in the American colony to give us their support, in order that the burden of affording relief may be distributed and not borne by the comparatively few.

Attention is once more called to the fact that no relief is granted except after the fullest possible investigation of the applicant's worthiness. The special "Committee of Investigation" has been most conscientious and painstaking in its efforts. It held no less than twenty-four meetings during the year, at which applicants were personally cross-examined and the merit of their representations established before assistance was given. The following special Report gives an idea of some types of cases relieved:

"The investigating committee has acted upon all important cases coming before it requiring a consensus of opinion; it has sent back to their adopted country many German-Americans and especially mothers and children, who have found themselves stranded in Germany without any means of support; it has also sent back a veteran of the Civil war and pensioner of the United States government; it has afforded assistance to a German who fought in the war mentioned and is also a pensioner; it is at present affording assistance to an American woman with eight children, the eldest sixteen, for whom a situation was found in an American firm; in dispensing which aid, however, the committee has endeavoured to save the self-respect of the persons helped and assisted them solely to help themselves. In the special case mentioned the committee received practical aid from two ladies of the American colony. One American woman in Berlin who had got into difficulties was, by a timely loan, enabled to re-instate herself and is now again self-supporting. In every case aid has been given with a sole view to assisting the persons to help themselves and not become a burden on the community."

Assistance has been given in all cases as "loans." One must reckon with the average ingratitude encountered in charity work and with the nonchalance with which promises made in stress are broken in prosperity, but it is gratifying to note that no less than 1,091 marks was paid back to the treasurer during 1907. Many of these repayments were from students, who found themselves in financial straits pending the delayed arrival of remittances and from other causes, and were saved from the pawn-shop and the "loan-shark."

#### THE CROWN JEWELS MYSTERY.

Sir Arthur Vicars, the custodian of the Crown jewels that were stolen from Dublin Castle some months ago, has been dismissed from his office as Ulster King of Arms, his successor being Captain Nevile R. Wilkinson.

General dissatisfaction prevails at the action of the Government throughout this matter, and it is understood that questions will shortly be asked in Parliament, and a demand for a thorough investigation brought forward.

#### THE "RING" IN LONDON.

That the "Ring" performances at Covent Garden, so far as they have gone, have been a triumphant success, is admitted by those best qualified to judge, and it is not surprising to learn that for the second cycle all reserved seats were sold, with the exception of some orchestra stalls, a few boxes, and places in the gallery slips, where one always sees a craning crowd when a Melba, a Caruso, or a Tetrassini is singing. Throughout the week, says the *Globe*, the performances have been carried on in that Bayreuthian darkness which the master held to be necessary to the full enjoyment of his work. The problem of showing persons to their seats after darkness has fallen—in other words, when the curtain has gone up—has been solved by providing the attendants with electric torches. Everyone who heard Mr. Walter Hyde as *Siegfried* in *The Valkyrie* last week is loud in praise of the performance.

## DRESDEN

We regret to record the death of Edward Benzler, Esq., in London, on Friday, January 31st. His family had been connected with Russia and Dresden for many years in the past, and he himself made Dresden his residence until, quite recently, health considerations induced him to seek a milder climate in the winter. He was deeply esteemed by all who knew him for his sincerity and generosity of nature, and especially by the congregation of All Saints' for his munificent liberality and devoted attachment to the English Church.

Grand Sacred Concert by the Lehmann-Osten Choir. In the Martin Luther Kirche on Sunday afternoon a grand sacred concert was given by the Lehmann-Osten Choir for the benefit of the sick and poor in the parish. That was certainly a praiseworthy object, and the fairly large attendance should secure to those in whose interests the concert was given a considerable alleviation of their needs. In view of the benevolent purpose of the concert-givers criticism must not be too strict. The programme was a varied one, the gold of real works of art being marred by the tinsel of pieces of little merit. Harmless dulness, as in Wermann's "Frühlingsgruss," one can put up with, but the want of taste evinced in the arrangement of Beethoven's majestic stage-song "Die Ehre Gottes in der Natur," or of Bizet's "Agnus Dei," for the cornet-à-piston challenges the sharpest objection, even when they are sonorously rendered, as they were by Herr Wiggert. Thank Heaven! the exquisite art of Frau Nast made ample amends for such unsavoury morsels; to listen to the wonderfully sweet tones of her voice, the absolute beauty of which was penetrated and animated by so much warmth of heart, was a pure and quite unearthly delight. Besides Frau Nast, another artist of rank was heard—Frau Bauer-Ziech, whose extraordinary harp-playing is so well-known that nothing new need be said of it here. But in this church Frau Bauer-Ziech had to contend with the tricks of the changing temperature, and could not keep her instrument in perfect tune. The concert-singer Herr Enderlein afforded pleasure with his fine resonant baritone voice, which, however, is not as yet fully cultivated. Consequently he could not do full justice to the meaning of his solo songs. His singing was most effective in Reinhold Becker's admirable composition "Wo du hingehst". In this his sonorous baritone mingled in the happiest manner with the voices of the ladies' choir, and the effect was very good. The choral numbers showed careful preparation and a rich volume of tone throughout. In particular, the 4-part Chorale "Ich weiss, mein Gott", by Max Reger, for *à capella* Choir, left a deep impression. Herr Richard Schmidt, in his playing of the E-flat Sonata of Bach, showed considerable skill as an organist but had not full scope for his art owing to the limited capabilities of the instrument.

This is generally assumed to have been his debut at Covent Garden. As a matter of fact, he sang there when Professor Villiers Stanford's *Much Ado About Nothing* was produced. The programme records "Borachio—Mr. Hyde"; evidently neither the part nor the singer (at that time) warranted the Walter. His incursion into musical comedy has been valuable in giving him a thorough knowledge of the stage. We should not be surprised to find the new *Siegfried* trying the part in German before many grand seasons are past. We understand Mr. Hyde prepared himself for the rôle, and had no coaching until he attended the first rehearsal.

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**STRIKE OF TYNE SHIPBUILDERS.**

On Saturday a notice was issued at the Tyne shipbuilding establishments stating that in consequence of the strike of a number of the wharf workers, the management found it impossible to keep the yards open. Therefore, all employes would be discharged on the 15th inst. Similar notices will also be issued at all the building yards on the North East coast.

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**NEWS FROM AMERICA.**

**JAPANESE ARMAMENTS.**

A cable has been received in New York from Tokio to the effect that the Japanese Minister for War, in answer to a question as to whom Japan's armaments were against, said that they were not directed against any one nation, but were kept in readiness to meet any eventualities in the Pacific Ocean, where Japan had a long coast-line to protect.

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**THE VOYAGE OF THE ARMADA.**

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**HARRY THAW CONSIGNED TO ASYLUM.**

After a deliberation of 25 hours' duration, in which 14 ballots were taken, the jurymen in the Thaw trial brought in a verdict of not guilty, on the grounds of insanity. The court ordered Thaw to be taken to the Matteawan Asylum for the criminal insane and detained for an unlimited period, as his liberation would endanger the public safety. Harry Thaw was taken to Matteawan the same day, accompanied by his counsel.

(It is our opinion that before very long Mr. Harry Thaw will be seen boarding a steamer for Europe, in order to recover his shattered health.)

**TORNADO IN MISSISSIPPI.**

It is reported from Hazelhurst, Miss., that a violent tornado has ravaged the town, causing many deaths and immense damage. 20 people are said to have lost their lives, while 40 are reported to be injured.

**NEW JAPANESE LEGATION.**

Baron Chinda, Japanese Under Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, says a Tokio telegram, informed Parliament that a Japanese legation is to be founded in Chili, with the object of improving commercial relations with that country and regulating emigration. Baron Chinda stated that Chili and the Argentine were excellent fields for Japanese emigrants.

**THE ROYAL ASSASSINATIONS IN PORTUGAL.**

King Carlos of Portugal and the Crown Prince were shot at and killed by a group of men at Lisbon on Saturday evening, on their return to the capital from Villa Vicosa. The Infanta Manuel was slightly wounded.

Below we give all the telegrams relating to the occurrence received up to date, from which it will be seen that no very lucid narrative can be gathered.

Lisbon, February 2.

Just past 5 o'clock yesterday afternoon the King and his family arrived here from Villa Vicosa. As the open carriage containing the party emerged from the Praço do Commercio into the Arsenal Street, a number of men opened fire on the vehicle with carbines, shooting the King and Crown Prince, both of whom were conveyed to the Marine Arsenal in a dying condition. They expired shortly afterwards. The police killed three of the murderers on the spot, afterwards carrying their bodies to the Town Hall. King Carlos, the Crown Prince, Queen Amalie and the Infanta Manuel were in the one carriage. When the shots were fired the Queen stood up and attempted to shield the Crown Prince with her body. The King and the Crown Prince were each struck by three bullets, the Infanta was slightly wounded, while the Queen escaped unhurt.

Later.

It has been ascertained that three bullets struck the King, one penetrating the back of his neck, the second pierced his shoulder and the third his throat. The third shot severed his jugular vein and was the fatal one. The Crown Prince also received three bullets in the head and chest. The Infanta Manuel was wounded on the chin and arm. When the King was carried to the Marine Arsenal he was already dead but the Crown Prince survived for five minutes. The Queen and the Infanta returned to the castle at 7 p.m. The square in front of the Marine Arsenal, the Town Hall and the Bank of Portugal were occupied by military. Count Francisco Figueira, Ordnance Officer to the King, who was walking beside the carriage, killed one of the assassins with his revolver, and a policeman slew another in the vicinity of the Town Hall. Their identity has not yet been established; it is believed, however, that one is a Frenchman and the other a Spaniard. They used 5-shot repeating carbines, and concealed the weapons beneath their mantles. The news of the tragedy spread through the town with great rapidity; all shops were closed. The new king is the Infanta Manuel, under the regency of the Queen. The bodies of the King and the Crown Prince were taken at 9 o'clock in the evening to the Palace Necessidades in closed landaus, escorted by municipal cavalry.

Later.

The Ministers met in conference today. Energetic military precautions have been taken, and a large number of people have been arrested, the police having discovered several bombs and weapons. A number of military officials are supposed to be implicated in the regicide plot. The former minister Senhor Alpoim is confined to his residence on

## STOP PRESS NEWS.

London, February 3. Reuter's Bureau learns that in order to avoid misunderstanding and erroneous inferences orders have been issued that only one battleship and one cruiser of the British fleet at Vigo shall go to Lisbon, instead of the entire squadron. The two warships were expected to drop anchor in the Tagus yesterday.

Madrid, February 3. All travellers from Portugal are strictly watched. The papers say that the trains from Portugal came in yesterday without any passengers or baggage. The Civil Guard have occupied the frontier station of Valencia de Alcanara.

Lisbon, February 3. The Agence Havas reports that a band of armed men tried to induce two companies of infantry to mutiny. They were, however, felled on by the soldiers and repulsed.

parole not to leave it. Among those arrested are Senhor Furtado, an ex-naval officer and deputy, and several prominent Republican leaders.

Paris, February 2.

According to private reports received here from Lisbon Queen Amalie was slightly wounded in the shoulder as she was trying to shield the Crown Prince from the murderers' fire. The Portuguese Government is not only watching the Republicans and Revolutionaries, but also the followers of Dom Miguel de Braganza. It is also stated that the Premier, Senhor Franco, issued a proclamation this morning relative to the assassinations and the accession to the throne of the Infanta Manuel. The military and state dignitaries have taken the oath of allegiance to the new King, and in all the garrisons the soldiers have also been sworn in. Dom Manuel has confirmed the powers granted to the cabinet of Senhor Franco by the murdered monarch. Up to the present the great majority of the populace is said to be very hostile towards the revolutionaries and the regicides.

Lisbon, February 2.

The Foreign Minister has stated that the assassins were armed with carbines and revolvers, and had been hired by political agitators hostile to the Government. Among those killed is a Frenchman, upon whose body was found the price of the crime. Dom Manuel's condition is satisfactory; his wound has so far not developed any complications. Numerous messages of condolence have reached the castle from all parts.

Lisbon, February 2.

The official Gazette publishes a Royal message ordering general mourning for four months. All public entertainments are forbidden for a period of eight days. The council of state will meet today in order to proclaim Manuel II. as King. Last night the Queen received the Conservative leaders Senhor Pinto and General Pimentel; also the Nationalist leader Count Brentiandos. Her Majesty further had a long conversation with the Premier, Senhor Franco. The bodies of the King and Crown Prince have been embalmed, and are lying in state in an apartment of the castle. The exact date of the funeral has not yet been settled. Dom Manuel carries one arm in a sling but suffers no pain. The police are very reticent concerning the identity of the assassins and the measures that are being taken relative to the deed.

Lisbon, February 2.

Further particulars of the tragedy are becoming known. A great crowd had gathered near the station to see their Majesties drive past. As the carriage approached the Finance Ministry at a moderate speed, a man dressed like a sportsman stepped out of the crowd and fired at the King with a revolver, wounding him in the left side. The Queen and the Crown Prince uttered an involuntary cry, the former pointing at the assassin with a bouquet of flowers which she held in her hand, but before he could be seized he had fired again, the bullet striking the King in the back. His Majesty raised his hand to his head and collapsed in the right corner of the vehicle. Thereupon several people hurled themselves upon the murderer who, as he was felled to the ground,

succeeded in firing still another shot, which did no damage. In the meantime, a second individual, with a black beard and wrapped in a long mantle, stepped up to the carriage and fired point blank at the Crown Prince twice with a revolver, the shots striking him in the face and chest. In the act of firing again the man's weapon was knocked out of his grasp by a policeman, who then cut the assassin down with his sabre. At this moment of general panic the Duke of Oporto drove up to the scene in an automobile, drew a revolver and followed the royal carriage with the weapon in his hand. The death of Dom Carlos was almost instantaneous, but the Crown Prince lived for five minutes after receiving his wounds. The bodies were taken to the surgical station of the Marine Arsenal, where the surgeons ascertained that the King had received two bullets, one of which had severed his spinal cord. The Crown Prince had been shot through the right cheek, the bullet entering the nose, while a second one pierced his lungs. The Queen and the Infanta Manuel both received slight wounds and were conveyed to another part of the Arsenal, where the news of the deaths were communicated to them. The Queen-Mother Pia arrived soon afterwards.

Lisbon, February 2.

A special edition of the *Diario do Governo* publishes the following royal proclamation:

"Portuguese! A detestable crime has filled my heart with deep sorrow, as a son and brother. I know the nation shares my grief and condemns this terrible and unprecedented deed. According to the constitution I am called upon to govern the country, and I shall do all in my power to work for the nation's welfare and to gain the love of my people. I will protect the Catholic religion and the status of the kingdom, and will try to maintain the political constitution of the people. At the same time I intend to confirm the present ministers in their respective offices. (Signed) Manuel II."

This proclamation was countersigned by all the ministers.

Their Majesties the Emperor and the King of Saxony sent messages of condolence to Don Manuel and the Queen as soon as they received the terrible news. Mourning has been ordered for the Berlin Court for four weeks, and, in consequence, the Court Ball which was to take place in a week's time has been postponed.

#### ENGLISH WARSHIPS ORDERED TO LISBON.

The *Daily Telegraph* reports from Madrid that the British Atlantic Fleet has received orders to leave Vigo for Lisbon, there to observe the development of the situation. A later telegram from Vigo states that the Fleet weighed anchor and steamed for Lisbon yesterday morning.

A Madrid telegram reports that the voyage undertaken by the British squadron from Vigo to Portuguese waters was arranged before the tragic occurrences in Lisbon.

#### THE NEW KING AND HIS PARLIAMENT.

Dom Manuel opened yesterday's sitting of the Portuguese Parliament and, deeply moved, said that inexperienced as he was and without knowledge of political life, he trusted entirely to the patriotism and wisdom of the members.

#### THE RUMOURED ATTEMPT ON SPANISH MONARCHS.

After the reports in some papers to the effect that an attempt had been made on the King and Queen of Spain the adjoined message is interesting: The following telegram has been received from Madrid: The Government has despatched the cruiser "Princess of the Asturias" to Lisbon. The derailment of the royal train near Casablanca station was a pure accident. King Alphonso telegraphed to the Premier, however, in order to reassure him in regard to the accident. One of the Portuguese regicides who was killed is said to have been a Spaniard who was arrested in connection with the San Antonio street bomb outrage, subsequently being released. An Italian has also been arrested on suspicion of being concerned in the Lisbon assassinations. The probable composition of the new Portuguese cabinet will be as follows: Premier (without portfolio) Admiral Ferreira; War Minister, Senhor Amaral; Justice, Mattias Minos; Finance, Alpoim; Interior, Souza; Foreign Affairs, Beiras; Public Works, Linna; Marine, Azerodo.

#### ASSASSIN'S IDENTITY ESTABLISHED.

One of the regicides has proved to be a Lisbon school-master, 30 years of age, who was formerly a sergeant in the Seventh Cavalry. The other two are said to be Portuguese commercial clerks.

#### SPANISH FRONTIER PRECAUTIONS.

News reaches Paris from Madrid that for the present only police measures are being taken by the Spanish Government on the Portuguese frontier, troops not having been employed as yet. Similar measures have been inaugurated on the French frontier in order that revolutionaries and anarchists who may be attempting to escape from Portugal can be stopped. Private telegrams from Lisbon state that several hundreds of suspects have been arrested there.

#### PRECAUTIONARY MEASURES IN SPAIN.

An extraordinary council of the Ministry took place at Madrid on Sunday, at the close of which

the Premier, Senor Maura, proceeded to Seville, where he had an audience with the King. His Majesty returned to the capital later, and called on the Comtesse de Paris in order to offer his condolences.

According to the *Imparcial*, the Madrid police have received special and minute instructions to watch suspects; the military are confined to barracks.

#### ROYAL SYMPATHY FROM ENGLAND.

King Edward and Queen Alexandra telegraphed messages of heartfelt sympathy to the afflicted Queen Amalie and Dom Manuel of Portugal. In consequence of the terrible crime at Lisbon the proposed visit of the King and Queen of England to Denmark has been postponed.

#### RUSSIAN SYMPATHY.

A telegram from St. Petersburg says that the Czar has telegraphed to the Queen of Portugal, King Manuel and the Duke of Oporto, the murdered king's brother, his deep sympathy.

##### RAILROAD GOES BANKRUPT.

The Frankfurter Zeitung reports from New York that the Detroit, Toledo and Ironton Railroad has gone into bankruptcy. The capital is 25 million dollars, the outstanding bonds representing a similar amount. The management attributes the railroad's inability to pay interest on these bonds to detrimental railroad legislation.

##### PROSECUTION OF FINANCIERS.

Reuter reports from Salt Lake City that the deputy of Mr. Bonaparte, Attorney General, has asked for a decision from the Federal Court of the United States in the proceedings against the Union Pacific, the Atchison, Topeka and Santa Fé, the Southern Pacific and other railroads of the Harriman system, as well as against Mr. E. H. Harriman and Mr. Jacob S. Schiff, on a charge of impeding commerce. The decision is asked for on the basis of the Congressional acts of July 2nd, 1890.
