BERLIN

The American Womens Club will hold their bi-monthly Tea next Saturday, February 15th, Miss Crandell being hostess.

Lincoln's birthday was celebrated on Wednesday night in the American Church by an entertainment. Doctor Stevenson of Ohio addressed the audience and gave a fine picture of the martyred President's life and work. For his admirable speech he was loudly applauded.

Washington's birthday will be celebrated by the American colony of Berlin, as already announced in these columns, on February 22nd, by a Dinner and Dance, to be held in the Zoological Garden.

Among the performers of the American Minstrel Show there is just now great bustle and expectation, as word has been received from Dresden that their visit there is definitely fixed for February 25th. The performance will take place in the Vereinshaus on that date.

An eminent American dentist in Berlin, Doctor Roy K. Belden of San Francisco, died a few days ago in his home on Bendler Strasse. The body was cremated on Wednesday last in Hamburg.

Apropos of his resignation as pastor of the American Church in Berlin, Doctor Dickie has received a magnificent letter from Mr. Andrew D. White, Mr. Tower's predecessor as American Ambassador in Berlin. Mr. White, who is now living a quiet life as professor of Cornell University in Ithaca, N. Y., says in the letter that no man knows better than himself what the American congregation of Berlin owes Rev. Dr. Dickie. He witnessed all the troubles and difficulties connected with the building of the church and is of the opinion that the church is to be considered as a lasting monument to the perseverance, endurance and ability of Dr. Dickie. It is needless to say that this letter has given Dr. Dickie great satisfaction.

Mr. Putnam Griswold has just signed a contract to sing in London, at Covent Garden, his parts in Wagner operas during the season from May 26th to June 25th of this year.

An interesting American society has just been organized in Berlin. It consists of men engaged in the study of ancient American history, customs, religion and folk-lore of the American aborigines &c. We will give further details of this interesting association at a later date.

It is intended to organize, under the leadership of the composer and conductor Herr D. Salins, an association for fostering the connection between American and German musicians. The new club, the name of which is proposed as the *Deutsch-amerikanischer Verein zur Pflege der Musik*, will arrange regular meetings, at which compositions of modern American and German musicians are to be reproduced.

After a stay of two years and a half Mr. Alexander v. Fielitz has returned from Chicago, and it is his intention to resume his work as teacher at the Stern Conservatory here next autumn. Mr. v. Fielitz has been giving music lessons at the Chicago Conservatory, and last year undertook a concert tour, with the Chicago orchestra, covering practically the whole Western area and giving about 120 concerts.

The 169th parish school, situated at Tempelhofer Ufer 2, has been closed on the advice of the sanitary authorities. On Tuesday morning two classes were suspended on account of extensive illness among the scholars, but during the day many more pupils became ill, the epidemic evidently being scarlet fever or measles. On Wednesday morning, therefore, Geh. Medizinalrat Dr. Granier, the district physician, held a consultation with the school doctor, Sanitätsrat Dr. P. Meyer, to decide upon

GENERAL NEWS.

NEWS FROM ENGLAND.

THE HOUSE OF COMMONS.

In the House of Commons on Wednesday the Prime Minister, Sir Henry Campbell-Bannerman, moved a resolution limiting the debate on the two Land Bills for Scotland to six days. Both these bills were thrown out by the House of Lords last Session, but have been re-introduced this Session in the Lower House. The Prime Minister now said that a feeling had arisen in favour of an alteration in these Bills on which the House had already recorded its opinion, and they had been brought in again thus early in the Session in order that the House of Lords might have sufficient time to reconsider them. This proceeding on the part of the Government was in accordance with the plan which he had explained last Session in regard to the relations between the two Houses; it would save time and maintain the dignity of the Lower House.

Mr. Balfour remarked that the object of the Government was, not to carry out a legislative policy or to confer a benefit on any class in Scotland, but to use these Bills as a means of attack on the House of Lords. The late bye-elections had shown that the Government was not in a position to carry out a great revolution.

The Chancellor of the Exchequer, Mr. Asquith, energetically repudiated Mr. Balfour's innuendoes as to the intentions of the Government in re-introducing the Bills, and said that the Bills were ardently supported in Scotland.

BATTLESHIP COALING RECORD.

The "King Edward VII," battleship, Capt. H. B. Pelly, flagship of the Commander-in-Chief of the Channel Fleet, coaling at Portsmouth from a collier alongside took in 1,180 tons in four hours five minutes—an average of 288.9 tons per hour.

MORE SUFFRAGETTES GO TO PRISON.

The women who were arrested on Wednesday in connexion with the riot at Westminster were brought up at the district court and sentenced to pay fines or undergo six weeks' imprisonment. Forty-eight of the suffragettes elected to go to prison, the remainder taking advantage of the fine option.

A project is on foot to arrange a Smoking Concert on Washington's birthday, February 22nd, for the Anglo-American colony in Dresden on a strictly co-operative basis. The idea was first mooted on the occasion of the Thanksgiving Ball at the Hotel Bristol on November 28th last, and since then it has been steadily growing in favour. The items on the programme, of course, will be given by Colony members, but it has been suggested that three genuine American "coons," who at present are giving nightly entertainments at the Café Speyer, Berlin, should be brought to Dresden for this occasion in order to enliven the proceedings.

It must be distinctly understood that the financial arrangements will be only made with a view to meeting actual expenses, but, should any surplus result, it will be disbursed among local charities.

All male members of the Anglo-American colony are invited to at once communicate with Mr. Victor Ha Clark, Moszczinsky Strasse 1, so that some idea may be obtained of the support likely to be rendered the proposal.

Further details will be announced in these columns, and meanwhile it is to be hoped that the plan will receive the hearty support of all anxious to participate in the fun.

The Committee of arrangements for the Minstrel Show, to take place on Tuesday, February 25, in the Vereinshaus, Zinzendorf Strasse, desire us to state that all seats for the performance will be unreserved, and no distinction will be made between holders of 10 mark and 5 mark tickets. The 10 mark tickets, however, entitle holders to participate in the dance and supper subsequent to the Show, while the 5 mark tickets are good for the performance only. It may interest our readers to hear that nearly all of the charming melodies in the first part of the programme are to be sung by prominent musical students from Berlin.

The Rev. Dr. Paul, Minister of the Robertson Memorial Parish, Edinburgh, will conduct Divine Service at the Church of Scotland, Bernhard Strasse 2, until further notice, in place of the Rev. Professor Simon, DD., who has hitherto kindly conducted the services in the absence of a regular minister.

On Saturday last the representatives of foreign Powers at Chemnitz paid a visit of congratulation to the two newly appointed municipal officers, Herr Oberbürgermeister Dr. Sturm and Herr Bürgermeister Dr. Hübschmann. The Consuls were received in the large reception hall of the Rathaus, and Mr. F. H. Feikin, director of the Nottingham Manufacturing Company and British Vice-Consul, congratulated Dr. Sturm upon his appointment and emphasised the good relations existing between Great Britain and the city of Chemnitz. He was followed by Dr. (phil.) Thomas H. Norton, the American Consul, who hoped that the election to office of Dr. Sturm would result in the furtherance of the already excellent commercial relations between the United States and Chemnitz. The Argentine and Portuguese consuls also spoke in a similar strain, and the delegation subsequently paid its respects to Dr. Hübschmann.

This unusual and courteous act on the part of the Consular corps was warmly appreciated by the Chemnitz municipal authorities.

The II. Liederabend of Elena Gerhardt. Whenever Fräulein Elena Gerhardt comes to Dresden, the musical Dresdeners keep holiday. Such emotion and so much elevation of soul as a Liederabend of this kind calls forth are experienced none too often. But where do we at present find in a concert singer radiant merits in such abundance and such lavish splendour as in Elena Gerhardt? The soft voice, of wonderful timbre, has been most carefully trained by Fräulein Hedmond, of Leipzig, and now commands with ease all the phases of expression in perfect gradation from the lightest *pianissimo* to triumphant *fortissimo*. Moreover, Fräul. Gerhardt's abundant musical feeling and eminent

NEWS FROM AMERICA.

THE GREAT AUTOMOBILE RACE.

A New York telegram states that six automobiles, including a German car to be occupied by three persons, arrived there on Wednesday, to take part in the race from New York to Paris, via the Behring Straits. The arrival of the contestants was witnessed by a huge crowd, and many automobiles were waiting to escort the visitors to their hotels.

NO PARDON FOR CAPTAIN OF "SLOCUM."

According to a despatch from New York, the Court of Appeal has upheld the sentence of ten years' imprisonment passed upon Captain van Schaick, who was in command of the steamer "General Slocum" when she was destroyed by fire in the East River in the summer of 1904, whereby 1,000 German Sunday-school scholars who were on a pleasure excursion lost their lives.

WELL-KNOWN ACTRESS ROBBED.

Burglars entered the apartments of Miss Ethel Barrymore, the well-known American actress, says a New York telegram, and succeeded in getting away with valuable booty. The jewellery they stole is estimated by Miss Barrymore to be worth several thousand dollars, while in addition she is the poorer by about 600 dollars in notes and cash and several valuable gold and silver articles.

LADY'S CONFISCATED FORTUNE.

According to the New York correspondent of the Globe, the Princess Lazarovitch, who, before her marriage was Miss Eleanor Calhoun, has arrived in New York from Europe, and intends proceeding to Washington, in order to call the attention of Government to her affairs. The Princess alleges that her fortune has been confiscated by the Servian Government, and asks that representations shall be made through diplomatic channels, in order to ensure its restoration to her.

PHENOMENAL NAVAL GUNNERY.

A Reuter telegram from New York states that it is asserted in American naval circles that a world's record in target practice has been created at Magdalena Bay, where the United States cruiser "Maryland" is reported to have averaged 8.43 hits per minute, while steaming 10 knots, at a target 12 ft. by 21 ft., distant 1,700 yards.

THE METROPOLITAN OPERA HOUSE.

With regard to the resignation of Mr. Heinrich Conried as director of the Metropolitan Opera House in New York, news of which we published yesterday, we learn that his successor, Signor Gatti-Casazza of Milan, will be assisted by Signor Arturo Toscanini, also of the Scala Theatre, Milan, and Herr Gustav Mahler. The manager will, as stated, be Herr Andreas Dippel, who has enjoyed considerable fame as a tenor and whose linguistic abilities enable him to sing his various rôles in the original tongue.

intelligence have been cultivated by the talented couple Herr and Frau Nikisch, and so Fräulein Gerhardt has become an artist who is ever able to fascinate us afresh, because her art is real and clear as youth and therefore seems ever new. And what is brought to life in works of art by the individual amiable personality of the radiant singer, is as new as if it had never before existed. The young Berlin composer Erich J. Wolff, who has hitherto been known in Dresden only as an extraordinary accompanist, may thank his lucky star that he has now been introduced as a composer by this rare artist; and his three wonderfully refined songs—"Ich bin eine Harfe," "Fäden," and "Knabe und Veilchen"—gained very considerably in value by her animating interpretation. But unquestionably the most beautiful of Fräulein Gerhardt's interpretations were the intoxicating melancholy songs of Tschaiakowsky, for whose characteristic art the gifted singer possesses all necessary qualities in profusion.

Professor Nikisch, who showed the young artist the way to success a year or two ago, came with her again this time, in order to add to the brilliance of her wreath of fame. It was easy to understand that the masterly tone-pictures which the pianoforte accompaniments became under his hands again elicited enthusiastic applause. He and Fräulein Gerhardt received an ovation. M. N.

It is urgently recommended that the loser of an article should make enquiry at the Fundamt personally, and not by a deputy who is insufficiently and perhaps not at all acquainted with the lost property.

Rudolph, left alone to work, is interrupted by Mimi, a flowergirl, who is in a fainting condition. He revives her with some wine, and confesses his love for her. They go out to join the others at the Café Mousus in the Quartier Latin. Here Marcel describes his old love Musette with an elderly admirer Alcindor. She sends the latter away to buy her some new shoes and deceives with Marcel. In the next scene Marcel is discovered working at a tavern on the outskirts of Paris; Mimi looking very ill and wretched, comes to beg Marcel help her, since Rudolph is killing her by his jealousy. She hides while Marcel talks to Rudolph but hearing Rudolph declare she is too ill to be cured she tells so violently that her presence is revealed and Rudolph is reconciled to her. In the last scene Marcel and Rudolph are once more alone in their garret; Schaunard appears again with provisions. In the midst of their gaily Musette brings in Mimi who is dying. Musette and Marcel go out to buy medicine, but on their return find Mimi has expired in Rudolph's arms.

NEWS FROM RUSSIA.

MAIL ROBBERY IN POLAND.

A Warsaw telegram says that a mail-van was attacked by a band of robbers between Ljublin and Janow. The driver and five soldiers of the escort were murdered, and two wounded, the robbers getting away with 10,000 roubles.

AMNESTY IN PORTUGAL.

Lisbon, February 13. Under the presidency of King Manuel a Council of State was held on Wednesday at which it was decided to grant an amnesty to all those imprisoned in connexion with the naval mutiny of April 1906. The amnesty is accompanied by a message from the King expressing his desire to inaugurate his reign by a constitutional act of grace. In the afternoon Dom Manuel bade farewell to the naval cadets who were his former comrades. The Government purposes to lay before the Cortes a measure for the reorganisation of the police force in Lisbon. The day on which the King will take the oath of allegiance to the Cortes is not yet settled.

Frankfort o. M. According to a statement published by the *Frankfurter Zeitung* the royal amnesty in Portugal will also embrace all officers and men of the Army and Navy now undergoing punishment for offences against discipline.

THE RAILWAY OUTRAGE IN BELGIUM.

According to a Brussels telegram the hotel-keeper Dardenne, one of the passengers injured in the railway accident on the Spa-Landen line, has committed suicide. From his statements it was suspected that he had been concerned in the outrage, and a search that was made in his house appeared to justify the suspicion. A short time ago he had received 400 francs as compensation for a slight injury in a railway accident. In this case he entered the train at the Overnas station about 400 yards from the spot at which the accident occurred, and it is supposed that he hoped to be injured in it to such an extent as to give him the right to claim heavy damages.

THE ARMENIAN DISTURBANCES.

According to a Constantinople telegram grave unrest has prevailed in Wan for the last six days. Consular despatches regarding the conflict reported in these columns yesterday are as follows: Acting upon information received from an Armenian the authorities made an exhaustive search in the Armenian church and also throughout the entire quarter, which led to the discovery of 37 chests containing in all 300 rifles, 300,000 cartridges and some dynamite. The informer was murdered by the incensed Armenian revolutionists, despite his being protected by troops, and the soldiers were fired on from the houses, 11 being killed or wounded. The consular despatches make no mention of a dynamite explosion, but this may have occurred later. Undoubtedly the discovered weapons were intended for use in a great *coup de main* against the Turkish authorities.

A SHOWER OF GOLD.

There was a veritable rain of gold in New York last week. Forty thousand dollars and banknotes flew through the air. This gold shower caused enormous excitement, occasioned as it was by the explosion of a dynamite bomb. The money was exposed in the window of an Italian banking firm, the director of which considered that exposing money in the window was a good advertisement. As a matter of fact every passer-by did stop before the window and become lost in contemplation of the money. One day last week the window was again besieged by a crowd, greedily devouring the heaps of money with their eyes, when someone suddenly hurled a bomb at the window. Whether the thrower of the bomb aimed at the money, or was a member of the "Black Hand," or wanted to kill someone in the bank is not known, but in any case an explosion heard far and wide followed, the window was smashed into a thousand fragments and heaps of gold were flung in all directions. The Bank lies in a densely populated Italian district and from all quarters streamed a vast mob, the wildest excitement that prevailed being still further increased when the fire brigade arrived and directed their hoses on the building, under the impression that the bank was on fire. Thanks to the general excitement the banker, who alone seems to have preserved his presence of mind, succeeded in collecting in boxes the scattered money before the crowd could get hold of it.

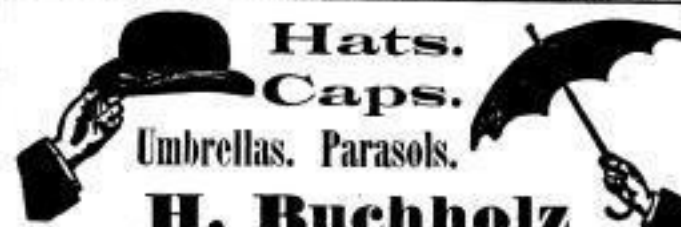
