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THE EUCHARISTIC PROCESSION IN LONDON.

According to a despatch from London of yesterday's date, the various Protestant bodies in England have presented a petition to the Home Secretary on the subject of the procession to be held today through the streets of London on the occasion of the Eucharistic Congress. In this procession various high dignitaries of the Roman Catholic Church are to take part, including no less a personage than Cardinal Vannutelli, who is the first Papal Legate to visit English shores since the early years of Elizabeth's reign. A feature of the procession will be the bearing of the Host, which is to be carried in public. This action will be illegal, according to the Emancipation Act of 1829; but it is not expected that the point will be pressed, as in the opinion of many this law can only be regarded as a dead letter. Nevertheless, there are unmistakable symptoms of violent opposition on the part of the more militant Protestant party, and it will be somewhat surprising if today's ceremonial is not marked by a more or less violent demonstration of popular disapproval. Such an event, viewed from any reasonable point of view, would be highly deplorable, and we do not think that the Roman Church authorities would injure their cause if they recognised the extreme delicacy of the situation and refrained from any action likely to wound public sensibilities. The mere act of a street procession in which are displayed the sacred symbols of the Roman creed may not improbably inflame passions which are best left undisturbed. Religious fanaticism has fortunately lost much of its potency under the enlightening influence of education and the growth of a broad-minded toleration: it has lost its power to make or mar the fortunes of a State, but it still has energy enough to embitter the hearts of the kindest of men.

There is an ominous tone in the petition to which we have referred above. The Home Secretary is warned that he will be held responsible for any breach of the peace that may occur as a result of the procession; but it is difficult to see what action that official can take without injuring the susceptibilities of a not inconsiderable section of the British public. It would, of course, be possible for him to actually forbid the event, and he would undoubtedly have no little justification for this measure, which would at least embody the openly expressed desires of both the Low Church party and the Free Church Council. At the eleventh hour, however, there is no intelligence of such a step having been taken, and we can therefore only express the hope that Christian tolerance may prevail over theological rancour, and that today's ceremonial will not be characterised by an unseemly outbreak which would revive a feud popularly supposed to have died of inanition.

NEWS FROM ENGLAND.

MR. CHURCHILL'S BRIDE.
(From our own correspondent.)

London, September 11.
The bride of Mr. Winston Churchill is to be Directoire, not only on her wedding day tomorrow, but for some time after, to judge by the accounts of the trousseau. Buttons, says one of the fashion papers, are to define the characteristic lines on her going-away gown of grey cloth, and embroidery is to perform a similar duty on a gown of white voile. It is pleasant to note that the trousseau is being made in Britain, as behoves the bride of a Cabinet Minister in a Radical Parliament. It is not so very many years since the bride of a Home Secretary went to Paris for her trousseau, paid for with money earned in trade in Glasgow. Naughty! Very naughty.
There is a Scottish saying that "a bonnie bride is easy dressed," and tomorrow's bride is bonnie enough to be a case in point. There have been some very lovely brides this year, including the Gay Gordon girls and the Gaiety girls, who have undertaken matrimony with scions of the peerage. One of these courageous young women wore a very extraordinary wedding costume: item, a pale blue gown; item, a black hat with crimson roses; item, a green scarf. Curious amalgam. The bride must have been bonnie, indeed, to have looked well in it, as no doubt she did.

VARIETY ARTISTE'S HUGE SALARY.

Mr. Tom McNaughton, manager for Miss Alice Lloyd, states that she is leaving for New York on Saturday to appear at the New York Theatre, Broadway, at a salary of £500 a week, "the largest ever paid an English music-hall artist in musical comedy." The contract is for 42 weeks a year for two years, a record contract for either England or America. Miss Lloyd is to appear in a musical comedy, specially written for her, entitled "The Bonnie Belle of Scotland."

AERONAUTS RESCUED AT SEA.

Rotterdam, September 11.
A pilot steamer belonging to this port has rescued two English balloonists whose balloon was on the point of falling into the sea.

NEWS FROM AMERICA.

AMBASSADOR'S SON AS A NEWSPAPER REPORTER.

One of the most interesting recruits to modern journalism is young Mr. Ogden Mills Reid, the son

of Mr. Whitelaw Reid, United States Ambassador in London.

Mr. Ogden Reid, says a New York report, has just started work as a political reporter on the New York Tribune, which is owned by his father. There is little doubt, of course, that the young man will inherit the ownership of the great newspaper from his father, and he has expressed his determination to work his way up on the staff, in order that he may gain a thorough acquaintance with every department of newspaper work.

In the course of a few words with another newspaper representative yesterday, Mr. Ogden Reid declared he had entered on his new life with a firm conviction that he could "make a good thing of it." He was prepared to devote his whole energies for the present to the task of making himself a really competent reporter. He regarded newspaper work, he said, as his object in life.

FATAL "L" RAILWAY ACCIDENT.

New York, September 11.
A train on the Brooklyn elevated railway which had been stopped in consequence of a fire on the line was run into by another train coming up from behind. The last carriage of the stationary train was completely smashed, one of the passengers in it being killed and twenty others more or less severely injured.

ORVILLE WRIGHT BEATS HIS OWN RECORD.

Fort Myers, September 12.
Mr. Orville Wright took another flight yesterday afternoon, which lasted 70 minutes 25 seconds. The speed he attained on this occasion and on Wednesday was 39 1/2 English miles an hour.

THE ATTACK ON MAJOR DREYFUS.

ACQUITTAL OF THE ASSAILANT.

Paris, September 11.
After a trial lasting two days M. Gregory, who on the occasion of the translation of Zola's ashes to the Panthéon fired two revolver shots at Major Dreyfus, wounding him in the left arm, was acquitted today. The Court held that the attempt was more in the nature of a symbolical demonstration than a deliberate outrage. Numerous witnesses testified to the high character of the accused, who is a well-known writer in the Paris press on military questions.

THE TOLSTOY CELEBRATIONS.

St. Petersburg, September 11.
An interesting tribute has reached Count Tolstoy from the United States of America, Mr. Edison, the famous inventor and scientist, having written asking the Count to allow a record of his voice to be taken for the gramophone. The Count has agreed,

BERLIN

The Emperor has been pleased to confer on Sir Charles Hardinge, British Under Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, the Order of the Red Eagle, first class.

While following the Army manoeuvres in Alsace Lorraine Prince Henry of Bavaria was thrown from his horse. He fell heavily on his face, and broke his nose, besides sustaining slight concussion of the brain. Prince Henry was conveyed to St. Johann in an automobile.

The official returns for the volume of emigration from the ports of Hamburg and Bremen during August, says a contemporary, show that the decrease continues to be maintained. Thus, from the port of Hamburg there sailed 7,909 persons, as compared with 14,592 persons in August of last year, while from Bremen there sailed 5,999 persons, as compared with 17,184 in August of last year. During the eight months ending with August the number of emigrants from Hamburg and Bremen was 80,965, as compared with 301,716 in the corresponding period of last year.

The military airship started on a long distance voyage at 10.30 on Thursday night, steered first to the westward against the wind, then turned and disappeared in a northerly direction. A later telegram says that the balloon, with Major Gross, Major Sperling, and two other officers, landed at Tegel yesterday morning after a trip lasting thirteen hours, in splendid condition. The balloon covered a distance of some 180 miles and ascended to a height of 3,000 feet.

Herr Hagenbeck received an ugly blow about the region of the stomach from one of his Polar bears during a "bear chute" performance on Thursday last, but the injury is not dangerous.

The period of good weather with which we have been favoured during the past week or so appears to have run its course, and autumn is now on us in very truth. The summer is, alas! all too short, and is inevitably followed by drenching downpours, clammy fogs, and all the other disagreeable attributes of autumn. From all parts of the world telegrams have been pouring in bearing the congratulations of eminent and distinguished men in every quarter of the globe. The more important festivities in connection with the celebrations took place yesterday afternoon.

Odessa, September 11.

The Governor-General took the most rigorous measures to suppress any manifestations here in the direction of celebrating Count Tolstoy's eightieth birthday anniversary. Not only were all meetings and demonstrations, even in private houses, strictly prohibited; but an order was issued to the Press forbidding even the mention of Count Tolstoy's name yesterday, much less the printing of any reference to the celebrations. No books or pamphlets were permitted to be shown on the book-stalls or in shops; and anyone showing signs of sympathy with Count Tolstoy was rendered liable to treatment similar to that meted out to revolutionaries.

During King Edward's stay at Marienbad, says a correspondent, he was much interested in a couple of children who were undergoing the cure. "Just imagine," he said, "I am obliged to walk 20 miles a day, which gives me an appetite like a wolf, while I am only allowed the smallest possible amount of food." The other was 16 years old, and weighed 15 stone. He also was on a strictly limited diet, though he pathetically confessed that if he were allowed he would be eating all day.

Grand Art Exhibition, Dresden 1908. The special exhibition, Art and Culture under the Electors of Saxony, which is managed by Colonel v. Kretschmar, has attracted much attention; especially room D, containing examples of the remarkable period of Augustus the Strong. The splendour of the Louis XIV. baroque style quite took the fancy of the German Courts, as Room D shows. Gold glitters on the pilasters, cornices and mouldings, ceiling, and furniture; the walls are hung with heavy purple silk damask. The throne room of Augustus the Strong in the royal palace furnished the models for the pilasters, while the cornice was modelled after that in the mathematical and geological museum in the Zwinger. The chased silver table and the silver *guéridons* are Augsburg work; the handsome large bronze clock was made in Paris. The portraits, which are also from the royal palace, were painted by the court painter Louis Silvestre. The vases and old Chinese porcelain on the mantelpiece had a value at that time far above their weight in silver. The parquet floor dates from the XVIII. century.—Next Thursday and Friday there will be a grand *Mostfest* (vintage fête) in the park and grounds. The procession of rejoicing vintagers is sure to be strikingly picturesque, and when it has passed the tasting of the new wine in the Jägerhof will be another interesting feature of the proceedings. On Thursday there is to be an illumination, and on Friday evening a display of fireworks.

Professor Zügel is the foremost of German animal painters, and there are very few artists who in a definitely limited sphere display such a mastery of their subject, such strongly marked individuality, and such infallible power of demonstration. He is one of the few really great Masters whose art is not born of the fashion of the moment but is a landmark in art-history, and he has raised animal-painting to a height hitherto unknown in Germany.

In a week's time there will be exhibited in the first-floor rooms of this gallery, in addition to the above, a collection of German paintings, drawings, bronzes, etc., representing the most eminent artists of the present day.

Azucena admits to Manrico that she had burnt her own child by mistake, instead of the Count's, but retracting her words Manrico's confidence in her returns. Hearing that Leonore is about to take the veil he rushes off to save her, and rescues her from the Count who had arrived at the Convent for the same purpose. The Count's soldiers capture Azucena and she is sentenced to be burnt. Manrico tries to save her but is caught and condemned to be executed. Leonore offers herself to the Count in return for the prisoner's release. She takes poison, and after telling her lover that he is to be freed dies at his feet. The Count finding himself duped orders Manrico's execution and when it is carried out Azucena informs the Count that Manrico was his brother.
