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KING EDWARD AND TURKEY.

CONSTANTINOPLE VISIT ANNOUNCED.

Constantinople, January 9.
While the *Tanin* states positively that the report published by the Agence Fournier of King Edward's intention to visit Constantinople has not yet been confirmed, the *Jeni Gazette* learns from an authentic source that King Edward will come here, and that his Majesty has expressed his wish that no reception may be offered him, as his visit will be of a private character. The *Jeni Gazette* lays stress on the importance of the visit, remarking: "The Ottomans will, of course, respect the King's wish; nevertheless, the simple reception will surpass all that the world has yet seen."

PRESIDENT AND CONGRESS.

SPECIAL MESSAGE IGNORED.

Washington, January 8.
At today's sitting of the House of Representatives a discussion took place on the allegation in President Roosevelt's annual Message that Congress made reductions in the estimates for the secret police service because a number of the members feared that they would be brought under the observation of that secret service. The House had requested the President to justify his allegation and he had sent a special message in which he quoted the speeches of several members in justification of what he had written. The Committee to which the matter had been referred reported that the supposition of the President was unjustified and baseless, and that the House must decline to concern itself with a communication which in the opinion of the Committee was derogatory to the respect due to the House. The special message was no answer to the request of the House and constituted an encroachment on its privileges, since it called in question the motives and the judgment of its members in the exercise of their constitutional functions. The House therefore declined to take into consideration that clause of the annual Message.

THE DISTURBANCES AT PRAGUE.

INCITEMENT FROM SERBIA.

Prague, January 9.
The postal authorities have confiscated several telegrams despatched from Belgrade to the Young National-Socialist Organisation of Prague, announcing the despatch of financial aid for the Prague demonstrators. Renewed demonstrations are announced for tomorrow (Sunday), and no fewer than 1,500 gendarmes have been detailed to the work of keeping order.

BRITISH TRADE DEPRESSION.

London, January 9.
A meeting of shipowners is to be held shortly in the north of England to consider the present serious condition of trade, and to open the way for an international union of shipowners which may modify the effect of excessive competition and keep up freights.

AMERICAN MURDER TRIAL.

TWO LADIES ACQUITTED.

New York, January 8.
Mrs. Erb and Mrs. Beisel, her sister, have been acquitted of the murder of Capt. J. Clayton Erb. The case was one of the most sensational trials ever heard in Delaware. Mrs. Beisel admitted shooting Capt. Erb, but said she acted in self-defence. It was stated that Capt. Erb was brutally ill-treating his wife when she summoned her sister to her assistance. Mrs. Beisel said she was wresting a revolver from the Captain, who was about to shoot his wife, when she shot him. It was alleged that Mrs. Erb had tried to poison her husband several weeks previously.

THE SEDITION IN INDIA.

IMPROVED SITUATION.

Calcutta, January 8.
The situation arising out of the religious riots has improved in consequence of the measures taken by the police and the efforts of the leading Mahometans who addressed the crowds, declaring that the Government would see that justice was done. Thousands of mill hands are, however, still on strike.

DEATH OF THE KRUPP HEIR.

Essen, January 9.
The little son of Herr and Frau Krupp von Bohlen-Halbach died yesterday.

THE EARTHQUAKE DISASTER.

SPEECHES IN PARLIAMENT.

A ROMANCE FROM REGGIO.

Rome, January 8.
The Chamber of Deputies was crowded today in anticipation of official accounts of the earthquake. The hall and tribunes were filled with deputies and their friends, and every Minister and prominent Parliamentarian was present. The Chamber President, Signor Marcora, prefaced his speech by thanking the Deputies who had hastened to the Chamber to join with him in showing to the country that Parliament was united in a single feeling of affection and pity for the victims of the terrible catastrophe. Two important cities, Messina and Reggio, the first of which had been a centre of ancient culture, and many other thriving districts had been razed to the ground. Thousands of their inhabitants lay dead beneath the ruins, while thousands more were injured. Words failed to express their anguish at such a disaster. The President, amid scenes of emotion in the Chamber, then eulogised the Deputies who had been killed. His speech was couched in most moving terms, and loud and prolonged applause greeted his declaration that Italy, the ancient mother of civilisation, took her place among the civilised nations in a fraternal bond of affection and humanity. He was giving expression to the feelings of the entire country when he voiced his admiration of the King of Italy, who, by being one of the first to arrive at the scene of the catastrophe, has showed a high example of duty fulfilled to the world. The speaker also paid a tribute to the noble Queen whose devotion and sympathy shown towards the sufferers had awakened the liveliest feelings of gratitude, and their sincere and hearty wish was that the royal lady would be spared for many years of happy life. (Loud applause, and cries of "God save the King and Queen!") "Our thanks," continued Signor Marcora, "also go out to the heroes of the foreign detachments who came to our aid, and thereby placed us under a permanent obligation." He hoped to witness the speedy rebuilding of the ruined cities, and to this end exhorted the Deputies to lay aside all party differences and join with the Government in an effort to remedy the misfortunes which had befallen the country. A proposal of the President to publish all the sympathetic addresses received from abroad, and the Italian answers thereto, in the official minutes of today's sitting was carried.

Signor Giolitti, the Premier, followed with a speech very much to the same effect. He was happy to see how the representatives of many nations had banded themselves together with the object of affording speedy assistance to the earthquake victims. A sturdy people, he said, should not be stunned by the blows of Fate; they must restrain their emotion and concentrate their energies on repairing the damage. Messina and Reggio must be rebuilt. (Loud applause.) That was a duty which Government and Parliament assumed today. It was also necessary that every prudent measure be taken for re-establishing order and community in both provinces. He advocated the formation of a committee to report on the situation.

BERLIN

Professor Felix Adler will deliver a commemorative address on Abraham Lincoln at Berlin University on February 12, the centennial of Lincoln's birth, a day which will be celebrated with honours throughout the world. The occasion is likely to be one of memorable interest in Berlin University annals. At the conclusion of the address Professor Adler will present to the University a bust of Lincoln, in bronze, which will be a replica of the bust which stands in the National Museum at Washington. The original is the work of the American sculptor Leonard Volk, who modelled it from life at the time of Lincoln's nomination, when America's great national hero was a man of about fifty. It is a strong and worthy reproduction of Abraham Lincoln's remarkable head.

Douglas Volk, the well known New York artist and the son of the sculptor, is an intimate friend of Professor Adler. It was through Mr. Douglas Volk that the present Roosevelt professor obtained from the National Museum the privilege of having a bronze replica made for presentation in Berlin. The bust presented by Professor Adler will be placed in the "Roosevelt Institute" of Berlin University.

No decision has as yet been arrived at as to what American presentations, if any, shall be made at the Berlin court this season. Ambassador and Mrs. Hill desire that the list shall remain as limited as possible, as they still regard themselves in the light of newcomers to Berlin. Mrs. David Jayne Hill was received in private audience by the Empress at noon on Saturday, January 2.

Herr Oberstleutnant and Frau von Werner, who are staying with their friend Frau von Sodenstern at Tauntzien Strasse 6, gave a small entertainment on Wednesday to the little Prince and Princess von Hohenzollern, son and daughter of Prince and Princess Carl von Hohenzollern. Fräulein von Oertzsch and Fräulein von Reischach, the Court ladies of Princess von Hohenzollern, were also present, besides Frau von Sodenstern and her daughter. The children, the elder of whom is only ten, were entertained with games.

Herr Oberstleutnant von Werner is the adjutant of Prince Carl von Hohenzollern. Frau von Werner is an American by birth, and was formerly Miss Tinnie Steinway, a native of one of the Southern States of the Union.

Mrs. Jno. Cleves-Symmes leaves Berlin today for a visit to England, where she will remain for some weeks, probably going later to the Riviera. Mrs. Cleves-Symmes will be accompanied to London by the daughters of the Siamese Minister to England, who have been her guests for a short time in Berlin.

Mrs. Wm. Irvin, of New York, entertained a number of her friends very delightfully on Friday afternoon in her beautiful apartment at Landshuter Strasse 32. Miss Irvin presided over the charmingly appointed tea-table. Among the guests were Rev. Dr. John R. Crosser, Mrs. Bernard Goldsmith, Mrs. McElwee, and Miss McElwee, Mrs. Minna L. Heyn, and Mr. E. T. Rev. Dr. Wm. Irvin's recent lecture before the Woman's Union of the American Church was exceedingly interesting, giving a description of life among the Mormons. Dr. Irvin has made a personal study of Mormon conditions in Utah.

Miss Lake, the widely known Directress of the British and American Governesses' Home, celebrated the tenth anniversary of her superintendence of the institution last Sunday, January 3. A large number of her friends assembled in the afternoon to offer congratulations on the event.

DRESDEN

King Friedrich August and Prince Johann Georg have announced their intention of visiting the Press Ball "Erzgebirgisches Sportfest" which is to take place at the Exhibition Palace on the 2nd of February. The subscription lists for the names of those wishing to attend the Ball will be ready on the 15th instant, and will be found on and after that date at the Dresdner Bank, König Johann Strasse; the Deutsche Bank, Waisenhaus Strasse; the Allgemeine Deutsche Creditanstalt, Altmarkt; the bank of Gebrüder Arnhold, Waisenhaus Strasse; the music store of F. Ries; the music-store of Ad. Brauer, Haupt Strasse; the Invalidendank, See Strasse; and at Tittmann's book-store, Prager Strasse. Tickets bearing the names of the applicants will also be issued at those places. The price of admission is 10 marks for ladies and 15 marks for gentlemen.

In the Scottish Church today (Sunday) Professor Denio of Bangor Theological Seminary, U.S.A., will conduct the morning service and preach. In the evening at 6 the Resident Minister Rev. T. H. Wright will lecture on the Address recently delivered by Lord Rosebery in Edinburgh on the subject of " thrift, personal and national."

At the II. concert of the Tonkünstlerverein on Friday last, Percy Sherwood's third Cello Sonata in C-minor was played by Herr Smith, with the composer at the piano. This new work, which was very favourably received by the large audience, was lately played in Hanover, and received the following criticism in the *Hannoverscher Courier*:

"The slow themes show a depth of melodious feeling which recalls the *Missa* of Brahms; all the themes are well marked, and worked out, in respect both to the motives and the instrumentation, with the most happily effective climaxes; the harmony is very interesting, and modern in the best sense. In short the work is one which deserves and will certainly attract attention."

The *Hannoversches Tageblatt* writes:

"Mr. Percy Sherwood's Sonata No. 3 for pianoforte and cello is a composition which again showed in the best light that creative talent of Sherwood which we have often had occasion to notice. In previous concerts Mr. Sherwood had played his first two cello Sonatas; both of them works evincing originality of conception and full of ideas, with brilliant thematic work and a wealth of refined modulation. This third Sonata may confidently take its place by the side of its elder sisters; it is a composition full of poetry and, particularly in the Finale allegro, contains admirably worked out thematic and dynamic climaxes. The playing of Mr. Sherwood was again above all praise and afforded the highest enjoyment. He is the best chamber pianoforte-player I know."

An interesting exhibition of German culinary art and allied industries, organised by the Cooks' Guild of Dresden and under the patronage of the King of Saxony, was opened yesterday at the Exhibition Palace and will continue until the 14th instant. It is on a very comprehensive scale, and well arranged in departments embracing household cookery, invalid cookery, the foods of the people, the means of instruction, etc.; and the "allied industries" occupy a good deal of space. The exhibition is open daily from 10 o'clock in the morning until 8 in the evening. Admission costs 1 mark.

The guards in the city today are furnished by the 12th Infantry regiment No. 177, whose band will play about 12.30 p.m. in the Neustadt.

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MUSIC AND ART NOTICES.

Prince and Princess Johann Georg honoured the art-gallery of Ernst Arnold with a visit on Friday and evinced lively interest in the sculptures exhibited by Frau von Bary-Doussin, as well as in the exhibition of drawings and paintings by Wilhelm Busch. Both these exhibitions have been visited by a great number of people in the last few days. The catalogue of the Wilhelm Busch collection contains a preface by Fritz v. Ostini, concluding with the following words: "The portrait of the dear man will be rendered dearer and more beautiful to us by this exhibition, which shows us the master, not only in his golden humour but in the deep strenuous earnestness of his art; which tells the German people, too, for the first time that their Wilhelm Busch was a painter, and no small one."

The second chamber music concert of the Bachmann Trio—Herren Bachmann, Bärtich, and Stenz—will be given on Saturday next the 16th instant at the Neustädter Casino, beginning at 7.30 p.m. The programme will include Schubert's trio in E-flat, and Mendelssohn's trio in C-minor (in commemoration of the 100th anniversary of the composer's birth). Tickets from H. Beck.

Tomorrow (Monday) at 11.30 a.m., Miss Watson will give the second of the six lectures on Egypt, in her rooms at Gutzkow Strasse 33, II. The Temples of the Middle Empire and their builders, will receive especial attention. To this period belong the great Pharaohs, Rameses the Great and Seti the First, whose names are familiar to all. It is the Great Age of Egypt, an age which has left its monuments in many places along the Nile—at Luxor, Karnak, Abydos.

PLOT. Tristan has been over to Ireland to woo the princess Isolde for his uncle King Marke. Isolde loves Tristan, and finding him cold to her, attempts to poison herself and him; but Brangäne, her attendant, changes the poison for a love-potion. Under its influence, Tristan and Isolde have secret interviews after her marriage with Marke, but they are betrayed by the King's friend Melot. Tristan attempts to escape with Isolde, but is severely wounded by Melot. Kurvenal, his faithful servant, takes him to Brittany, and they watch in vain for a ship which is bringing Isolde to nurse him. When it comes in sight Tristan tears off the bandages from his wound and expires in Isolde's arms. King Marke has followed her, and Kurvenal kills Melot when he enters. PENSION KOSMOS, Dresden-A.
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The measures introduced in the Chamber today for the alleviation of suffering caused by the earthquake, empower the Government to make use of 30 million lire, taken from the Budget excess, for the purpose of repairing and rebuilding the edifices affected by the earthquake. The work is to be begun without delay. Various new taxes and increases in existing taxes are contemplated for 1909 and 1910, in order to cover the enormous expenses entailed by the disaster.

Rome, January 8.

A story related by survivors from Reggio shows that even an earthquake can produce its romance. A young student for the priesthood, aged 22, having himself escaped, set to work to find his sister, who was beneath the ruins of a young ladies' college. After three days, and quite by chance, he found her alive and well in a cellar full of dead and living people, but when they had embraced the girl told her brother that somewhere among the wreckage of the college lay her great friend, who she believed was still alive, and they determined to try to save her. To their great joy there came a voice which guided them to a fallen beam. Beneath it they found the girl for whom they were looking. She was not badly hurt, and when the weight was lifted off her the three made their way together to a safer part of the town. The young man, however, had fallen in love with the rescued girl, who was strikingly beautiful, and gratitude for her life had perhaps inspired similar sentiments in her. At any rate, they shortly afterwards met a priest, whom the student knew, and to whom he announced his renunciation of his career as a Seminarist, in order that he might marry her then and there. The priest gave them his blessing and united them.

Jena, January 8.

The local geologist, Dr. Gravelitz, has established the fact that the bed of the Straits of Messina has in places silted up in consequence of the earthquake. At some points the soundings show only fifteen feet.

Rome, January 9.

General Mazza has telegraphed to the Premier that it will be possible to recover all monies and archives of the public departments from the ruins of Reggio di Calabria. The railway communication between Reggio and Naples will be re-established within three days.

The German Help Committee held a meeting in Berlin on Thursday, which was attended, among others, by the Saxon Minister, Count Vitzthum. Reports from the scene of the disaster which had arrived up to date were discussed. The German consul at Messina telegraphed that 20,000 fugitives had arrived in Catania from Messina, and were in pressing need of aid. The local help organisation had insufficient means to alleviate the distress. The consul therefore begged for more help. In view of this statement, the Committee decided to transmit to the Red Cross Society further supplies of provisions and other necessaries to be placed at the disposal of the sufferers.

Herr Kommerzienrat Paul Pfund, of Dresden, has donated 2,500 cases of condensed milk to the children and injured victims of the earthquake catastrophe.

The Berlin Committee has decided to recommend that materials and monies in aid of the earthquake victims be sent direct from the large German towns to Italy. The next few days will probably witness the direct despatch of provisions from Dresden, Munich, Karlsruhe, Stuttgart, and Darmstadt.

THE SITUATION IN CHINA.

Pekin, January 8.

The Ambassadors of America and Great Britain have relinquished the plan of inviting the Powers to make a joint representation to the Chinese Government in consequence of the change of policy which is believed to have been inaugurated by the dismissal of Yuan-shi-kai.

BRITISH INFLUENCE IN TIBET.

DR. SVEN HEDIN'S VIEWS.

Stockholm, January 9.

Dr. Sven Hedin, the renowned explorer, in the course of an interview with a Press representative in Moscow, stated his belief that he had observed during the course of his travels in Tibet that Great Britain's position since the Lhasa expedition had become decidedly unfavourable. The Tibetans, particularly the clerical element, were hostile to the British, while, on the other hand, Chinese influence had undergone a marked increase.

ROBBERY FROM THE RIVIERA EXPRESS.

Paris, January 9.

A bag containing securities to the value of a million francs was stolen yesterday from a goods van belonging to the Paris-Lyons-Mediterranean Railway standing in front of the goods office of the Eastern Railway Company on the chaussée de d'Antis. All the banks have been informed of the robbery and, as the securities were payable only to the holders named in them, they should not be negotiable by the thieves.
