

his Challenge. After it the King sent him a Commission with Instructions, to be his sole Ambassador to the Emperor in this great Cause. He was fully satisfied here by his Conferences with many learned Germans. One of them was Cornelius Agrippa Dr. of both Laws, Judge of the Prerogative-Court and Councillor to the Emperor, who was afterwards cast into Prison, where he died for expressing his Mind, as was thought, some what more plainly upon this Affair. While he was abroad, he went to Nieremberg and made Acquaintance with Osiander perswading him, to go on in harmonizing the Gospels, which he did and he published his Work in the Year 1537. and dedicated it to Dr. Cranmer, then Abp. who had obtained Osiander's Neece for his Wife. In the Year 1532. he secur'd a Traffick between the Merchants of England and the Emperour's Low-Countries and sollicitated the King for sending Supplies to the Emperour against the Turk. The King made also Use of him in another Embassy, to be secretly made to the Elector Frederick, Duke of Saxony.
