

It would be rather difficult to decide which of these hotels deserves preference over the others. They are all more or less frequented by the English and Americans. When not over-crowded with travellers the accommodations offered will be satisfactory. The prices are in most of these hotels rather high. Persons who have to consult their purses, or who object to large charges may find no less comfort in a second class hotel at a more reasonable price. Travellers accompanied by a family, coming to Dresden with the intention to stay here for some time, and who in the first instance put up at a fashionable hotel, but think their stay there too expensive, may find either through friends, or the Agency mentioned below, private apartments, or pensions where they may be very comfortable, and at moderate charges. In the former case they can have their meals either at home, or at one of the numerous excellent restaurants, indicated on page 15, where a good dinner may always be had for 10 to 15 groschen a person.

Strangers should, immediately on their arrival at the hotel, ask the porter for a copy of the "Dresden Advertiser", a weekly paper which will give them a great deal of information about this city. — Visitors who wish to take private apartments may apply to the British and American Agency, 22, Victoria-Strasse where a list of eligible apartments, furnished and unfurnished, is kept.
