Even the apparently cool pose in which many beautiful women have been banned upon the plate is merely a sign of the inner excitement with which this man, himself a bundle of nerves, understands how to inspire his victims. Thus his pictures become documents, revealing the people of to-day in their habit as they live, compounded of movement and change.

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
